It is easy there is a month's supply or old theese in the Winnipeg mark t some of this is Untario ch est. ting make or cheese in Maintoba was finited last year, and several carloads of Ontario cheese was brought in for the local market, in addition to many carloads or eastern cheese which went west to Exitish Columbia.

A party was in from the country this week trying to sell a lot or head dairy butter. Some or it was new goods, but a considerable portion was last season 6 make. Dairy butter held over from last season is practically of no value now as butter, and there is no sale for it. It would be difficult to obtain more for such goods than its value as grease.

Lie monereas Gazetic or June 1 seviews the cheese situation at that that as follows: "Receipts of cheese date as follows: continues very heavy, being 14,017 boxes we-cay. The market continues to drag and fractionally lower prices were accepted to-day, both for Ohtario and Quebec choese. For the former the range was \$1-2e to \$5-c, and for the latter, 77-8e to \$1-ic. These figures show a decline of over a full cent on the prices ruling a neck ago, and prices to-day in the constry decines a fraction on those and yesterday. Cable advices are not encouraging, and the indifference of buyers over there is increased by owners of sume cheese, which are being made for future delivery. As low as 378 6d has been named, on which basis the shipper would have to procure his enesse at 71-2c in the country, if he wanted to jet out at a profit.
