For a copy of all agreements made on behalf of Canada or by Canada on behalf of any other government or agency, with the International Nickel Company for special tax credits and/or special allowances for depreciation or depletion, under the Income War Tax Act, the Excess Profits Tax Act, or any other authority.

Mr. ILSLEY: There is no objection whatever to producing what is called for by this motion, but it has already been produced. Only one agreement was made under the War Exchange Conservation Act, and it was tabled shortly after it was made.

Mr. COLDWELL: There are no others?

Mr. ILSLEY: There are no others. I have made inquiry in our department and in the Department of National Revenue, and there is none there. If the hon. gentleman would like to let this motion stand until he verifies the fact that the information is already on the table, well and good; or perhaps he might agree to having it dropped.

Mr. COLDWELL: I will take the minister's word for it. I am prepared to drop the motion.
