ASSISTANCE TO NOVA SCOTIA ON STEEL INDUSTRY TAKEOVER

Question No. 538—Mr. Muir (Cape Breton-The Sydneys):

- 1. What has been the total amount of the assistance that has been made available to the Government of the Province of Nova Scotia by the federal government in the province's take-over of the steel industry on Cape Breton Island, have these monies been paid to the government and, if not, for what reason?
- 2. What arrangements have been made by the federal government to turn over the federal government's rights to certain loans made to the Dominion Steel and Coal Company for the construction of dock loading facilities at Sydney, Nova Scotia?
- Mr. Russell C. Honey (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Forestry and Rural Development): 1. \$9.9 million, of which \$2 million has been paid to the government of Nova Scotia. The remainder consists of (a) direct payments to the steel company; (b) turning over to the province of rights to loans made to the former owner.
- 2. Final arrangements to take up the federal offer are now under discussion with the province.
