CLOSING OF LACHINE CANAL

Mr. Frank Howard (Skeena): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct a question to the Minister of Transport or to whoever is acting for him today. There is an element of urgency in the question because an interim injunction relating to the matter in question expires either today or tomorrow. Does the minister plan to take any action to ensure that the Lachine Canal is not closed off and filled in?

Business of the House **BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE**

Mr. Baldwin: Mr. Speaker, may I be permitted to ask the President of the Privy Council what the order of business for the remainder of this week and for next week will be.

Mr. Macdonald (Rosedale): Mr. Speaker. tomorrow we propose to call a vote on the estate tax resolution which was presented today. Then we will call second reading of the bill to amend the Prairie Grain Advance Payments Act, and further stages if possible. When that is disposed of we will deal with the bill to amend the Customs Act, which is under the direction of the Minister of National Revenue. On Monday next we will call the report stage of the bill to amend the Aeronautics Act, to be followed by the report stage of the bill to amend the Navigable Waters Protection Act. On Tuesday we will call second reading of the bill to amend the Estate Tax Act, and we contemplate calling that measure on Wednesday and Thursday if that is necessary in order to dispose of all stages of the bill. If we find we are making better progress, I will make a statement later in the week.

Mr. Lewis: I have a supplementary question. The President of the Privy Council, in answer to questions regarding when we might expect the government reorganization bill or bills, has said more than once that he would be able to tell the house today, I think, about that legislation, which is obviously of tremendous importance and to which ministers continue to refer. Can we have word on when that bill or bills may be expected?

Mr. Macdonald (Rosedale): I am very hopeful of having it in the house within two weeks.
