FEDERAL-PROVINCIAL FISCAL ARRANGEMENTS AND ESTABLISHED PROGRAMS FINANCING ACT, 1977

MEASURE TO AMEND

Hon. Pierre Bussières (for the Minister of Finance) moved that Bill C-24, to amend laws relating to fiscal transfers to the provinces, be read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs.

He said: Madam Speaker, the bill whose second reading we are now broaching is designed to amend laws relating to fiscal transfers to the provinces. The bill now before the House will implement changes to the structure of fiscal agreements between the federal and provincial governments. Under those arrangements, the federal government will transfer over \$12 billion to the provinces in 1980-81. That amount reaches almost \$17 billion if we also take into account those payments related to the transfer of taxes under the Established Programs Financing Act. The financial effects of the changes provided under this bill are important in absolute terms and are an integral part of our efforts to limit government expenditures. However, they are of little importance compared with the total amount of transfers paid to the provinces by the federal government.

I should like to add that Bill C-24 is identical to Bill C-26 that was introduced on December 11, 1978. Moreover, the minister of finance of the previous government stated on November 6, 1979, before the Standing Committee on Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs that he intended to implement the provisions of Bill C-26. Bill C-24 therefore implements what has been federal policy for over two years.
