TOXIC POLLUTION OF GREAT LAKES—REMEDIAL ACTIONS

Mr. Bob Horner (Mississauga North): Mr. Speaker, this Government recognizes the toxic chemical problems of the Great Lakes and has devoted considerable resources to their resolution. Specific actions include amendments to the 1978 Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement in November, 1987, as well as a number of provisions dealing with toxic substances; substantial research, monitoring and surveillance effort on the lakes which has been undertaken to identify and assess toxic problems and appropriate remedial strategies; development of remedial action plans for 12 longstanding Canadian areas of concern where water quality is impaired, and development of studies and management plans with the United States on interconnecting channels of the lakes where toxic chemical problems are highlighted.

In a broader context the Canadian Environmental Protection Act passed earlier this summer will provide comprehensive management of chemicals so that Canada will not in the future be confronted with the kinds of problems which are prevalent today due to the neglect of the previous Government.

PENALTIES URGED FOR DESTRUCTION OF COMPUTERIZED DATA

Mr. John Oostrom (Willowdale): Mr. Speaker, computers have become an integral part of all aspects of Canadian society. Governments, industry, and individuals rely on computers to cover the entire spectrum of usages. However, this very efficient means of information storage and transfer can be brought to an abrupt halt by viruses.
