morning of the 5th December my thermometer indicated 22° and again on the 18th 18° below serving degree of cold which a not remarkable, but which had the effect of rendering the sadans a comfortable mode of transport.

tying at Edmonton on the 16th December I exchanged my horses adde for a small catiole, and on the 20th December com-st the winter journey to Red River. The cold long de-began in all its severity. On the 22nd December my thermo-ecleck in the morning indicated 39 below zero, later in the ting wind swept the long resolves of the Seatchewan River, and d revelling on the los almost insupportable. To note here the long investigation in great walley of the Sastatchewen, at times on the times and at times upon the neighbouring plains, would prove only to obtain a more lasting power, and to bind in a still more solid all visible Nature. No suman voice, no sound of bird or beast, in to break the intense silence of these vast solitudes of the wan. At length early in the month of February I quitted atchewan at Cedar Bake, crossed the ridge which separbr l tatchewan at Cedar ates the sheet of water from Lake Winnepegossis, and descending the latter t at Water-hen River, passed from thence to the Northern Lake to in outle Lake Manitoba. Finally on the 18th February I reached extremited ant of One Point on South shore of Manitobs and two days later the settlem arrived at Fort Garry.

In foll cession the osts of the

ad Lake route from Carlton, I passed in suc-River. Prince Albert, Forts a la Corne and Cumberland, the ose Lake, Shoal River and Manitoba House, and with few exceptions, tracelled upon ice the entire way.

The journey from france last occupied 119 days and embraced a disance of about 2,700 miles

I have now to offer the expression of my best acknowledgments to the Officers of the various posts 'of the Hudson Bay Company passed en route. To Mr. W. J. Christie, of Edmonton, to Mr. Richard Hardistry, of Victoria, as well as to Messrs Hackland, Sinclair, Ballenden, Trail, Turner, Belanger, Matheison, McBeath, Munro and McDonald, I am indebted for much kindness and hospitality, and I have to thank Mr. W.
