

CANADIAN TOBACCO PROTECTION—
AMENDMENTS TO INLAND REVENUE ACT—*Con.**Clements, H. S.* (West Kent)—908.

This is a question affecting a very large section of the farming community of Ontario, and should be dealt with—908. Canadian farmers can grow tobacco equal to any grown in the United States—909.

Dubeau, J. A. (Joliette)—899.

Statistics of factories, output, &c., recent growth of the industry amongst farmers, comparison 1896-1908—899-900. If present beneficial policy is adhered to magnificent results foretold in the near future—901. Canada can produce sufficient varieties to keep out almost all foreign growths—902. Advocates the establishment of educational stations; the colour of the stamps—903. Suggests desirable amendments to the Inland Revenue Act—904.

Ethier, J. A. C. (Two Mountains)—911.

Effects of the 10 cents duty on foreign tobaccos as shown in Two Mountains—911. Desirability of appointing experts, and of making the stamps uniform—912. Does not doubt that the government will amend the law and perhaps the tariff—913.

Henderson, D. (Halton)—914.

The whole secret of success in bringing Canadian tobacco into use will be in the curing—914. Never succeed in getting Canadian tobacco generally used till the flavour is obtained—915.

Laurier, Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid (Prime Minister)—921.

This amendment is not in order, not being germane to the motion—921. This is not the orderly way of doing it—922.

Maclean, W. F. (South York)—907.

The tobacco growers of Western Ontario have a substantial grievance—907. Should try to do something to ameliorate the conditions that at present exist—908.

Monk, F. D. (Jacques Cartier)—904.

Regrets the motion is confined to papers; the matter a grievance of long standing—904. The growth of the industry shows we can no longer tolerate a distinction so invidious—905. We must do what has been done in the States; gives examples—906. Wants a promise that the suggested amendments shall be made this session—907. Desires to move an amendment; the amendment is in order—921. It gives expression to the wish of every speaker—922.

Robitaille, L. (Quebec County)—909.

Not right for Monk to criticise the government's attitude in this matter—909. Suggestions by a Montreal cigar manufacturer—910. As time goes on Canadian cigars will equal, if not surpass, the imported—911.

Hopes the minister will so amend the regulations as to give greater encouragement to the growers—908.

Speaker, His Honour the—921.

Monk having spoken is not in order—921. An amendment must be relevant to the motion proposed to be amended—923.

Templeman, Hon. W. (Minister of Inland Revenue)—920.

Not familiar with what happened thirty years ago—920. Hopes before many weeks are passed to be in a position to state what the Bill will be—921.

CANNED GOODS ACT AMENDMENT.

House in Committee on Bill (No. 147) to repeal the Canned Goods Act—Hon. Sydney Fisher—6870.

Borden, R. L. (Carleton)—6877.

Government has one policy with regard to canned food and a different one for drugs—6877. Questions of jurisdiction and expediency—6879.

Fisher, Hon. Sydney (Minister of Agriculture)—6870.

This is an old statute never put into effect; difference between it and the Act passed last year—6870. Local trade left in the hands of provincial authorities—6871. Whole Act of last session applies to exported articles—6872. Duty of Provincial authorities regarding inspection and sale—6879. Explains the Adulteration of Foods and Patent Medicines Acts 6879-80.

Lancaster, E. A. (Lincoln)—6875.

Bill ought to apply to foods used at home as well as to that for export—6876.

Lennox, Haughton (South Simcoe)—6882.

Probable effect of repeal of the Act—6882-3. Difference between this statute and the Adulteration of Foods Act—6884.

Reid, J. D. (Grenville)—6885.

Canadians should be protected as well as foreigners—6885-6-7. Old Act could have been amended to cover the whole ground—6890.

Fisher, Hon. Sydney (Minister of Agriculture)—6221.

To repeal an old Act which has become obsolete—6221.
