COLONEL GEORGE T. DENISON

Before the Empire Club of Toronto

PRESIDENT PERRY introduced Col. George T. Denison as the youngest man in the Empire to-day at 77½ years of age; as one of the best speakers in the military service of Canada; one of the most highly esteemed citizens in Toronto, and the greatest military man we have in Canada; also famous as an author on military work, having won the first prize given by Russia some years ago for a treatise on the history of cavalry; as an author of recent books, one of which, "The Struggle for Imperial Unity," is an inspiration and an incentive for patriotic efforts. Col. Denison with a group of young Canadians like himself, some years ago took the initiative and saved the day for Canada in opposition to traitors within and without, men in the councils of the State, as well as interlopers from other countries, and who had held his ground against all kinds of criticism and stood firm to the flag.
