Rev. Colin Gibb Tells of Problems in

The Rev. Colin M. Gibb addressed crowded meeting at Old Country Club of the Parkdale Presbyterian Church last night, on "The Church and the Social Question." The interest aroused was so manifest that Mr. Gibb was on this subject a fortnight hence, when questions will be asked and a discus-

sion will follow the address.

Mr. Gibb said that his address referred to the old country only and had nothing to do with the state of affairs in Canada.

The number of people actively connected with the church, Mr. Gibb said, was 3 per cent. In London, 15 per cent. In New York and 50 per cent. In Scotland. On making enquiries he had found that one cause of non-attendance at church was the lack of symmetry the church with the pathy shown by the church with the workingman in his struggle for eman-

cipation.
On the other hand, other causes had been at work during the last 40 years, causes over which the church could exercise no control. The influx of the alien, the emigration of a large number of the best people, the increasing mobility of labor, requiring men to follow their tobs, universal education low their jobs, universal education leading men to think for themselves; all in various ways rendering things much more difficult for the church.

Mr. Gibb said that without direction no social benefit could be achieved, and he suggested that here was a duty which the church might undertake.
