Fixed carbon is the solid combustible matter of coal, which, on account of its lasting and heat-radiating qualities, is not so readily consumed as the volatile matter. Ash is the non-combustible foreign matter of the coal; it is all waste, and besides, may form clinkers and prevent free combustion.

Sulphur is always an objectionable element in coal. As it is accompanied with iron, it is likely to form clinkers with the ash. In the blast furnace it combines with the iron, making it brittle, and in gas and coke making it is in many ways deterimental.

Among these products from coal are coke, fuel and illuminating gas, together with their valuable by-products, oils, coal tar and ammonia, etc.
