Debts of Officials. Mr. Gamey enquired if the government s responsible by bond or otherwise for debts owing by officials. Col. Matheson said it had been the practice of the old government to give a guarantee to the banks, and if the amount was not satisfied to stop it out of salaries, There were five amounts owing—\$475, \$2946, \$400, \$200 and \$1050. The present government would not give guarantees for such debts. At the request of Mr. Gamey, the treasurer withheld the names of parties owing the debts.

Col. Matheson gave Mr. Ross the figures, showing the amount of arrears emitted by the treasury department on taxes chargeable under the Algoma Land Tax Act for 1905. 




