TORONTO JUNCTION. Junction Has a Water Shortage - Rapid Growth is Responsible. TORONTO JUNCTION, June 18.—The town is face to face with a serious problem in the scarcity of water, which has been this afternoon and tonight probably more marked than on any previous occasion. At 8.30 to-night the gauge at the No. 1 fire hall registered 15 lbs. pressure. It is before that the C.P.R. telephoned the power house that unless they got more pressure they would be compelled to close down. At certain times there was no water on the north side of the town. The present condition of affairs has been brought about by the rapid growth of the town, with which the pumping plant has not kept pace. The town's business, while in a satisfactory condition, will not, it is said, warrant any large expenditure at the present time. Large pits had been closed down for a short time yesterday, and to-day Carlton school was closed owing to the fact that there was no water for the pupils to drink. At the last session of the council a bill empowering the town to secure its supply of water from artesian springs was defeated. The present supply is drawn from the Humber. It is not known what action the council will take in the near future, but some temporary relief will probably be afforded at once.

NORTH TORONTO. Unique Event in Married Life - Caretaker Evolves Happy Idea. NORTH TORONTO, June 18.—Mr. and Mrs. Robert Clarke, 24 Webster-avenue, Toronto, well known throughout York County, celebrated the 22nd anniversary of their marriage life to-day. The venerable couple, both of good health and look forward to a good many more anniversaries. Mr. Clarke was born on Jan. 25, 1819, at Galway, Ireland, and came to Little York, now Toronto, with his parents when six months old, and has lived in York Township ever since. He has followed the occupation of a farmer for sixty years. On June 18, 1844, he was married to Miss Ann Wilson, who was born in Toronto on May 12, 1823. Their family consists of five sons and one daughter, the eldest being now but six months old, and one son 27 years old. The remaining sons are E. W. Clarke, Wm. A. Clarke, clerk of York Township; Robert, Wesley and George. Of the younger generation the aged couple count seven grandchildren and one great grandchild.
