Hon, T. Chase Casgrain Says It is Now Beyond Recall.

Hon. Sidney Fisher "Weakens" and Contends a Prohibitory Law is Not Called For - What Will Sir Wilfrid Laurier Do ? - Montreal

Montreal, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—A French Conservative member of the House of Commons, and a very prominent one at that, has finally declared before a meeting of his own people that the Manitoba school question is settled beyond recall.

Hon. Thomas Chase Casgrain, M.P., speaking last evening at a crowded meeting of the Marin Cab, declared that the school question was settled politically, although a greater deception was never perpetrated upon this province. "Let it be settled," replied Mr. Casgrain to Lord Aberdeen's declaration at Ottawa that His Excellency was consoled in leaving Cahada by the fact that such a difficult question was settled. "In England," Mr. Casgrain added, "the Government used means that need not be qualified," and he also in timated that flome had acceded to the requirements of diplomacy.

Some interesting details have been given out since the prohibition delegates returned from their interview with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues at Ottawa. It appears that Hon. Sidney Fisher, the champion prohibitionist in the Cabinet, has weakened, and with his leader will contend that at the affirmative vote was comparatively small, a prohibitory law is not called for. The delegates add, however, that the Government feel the gravity of the situation, and that Hon. Mr. Sifton appears to be the only Minister who is not apprehensive of the coming storm. They further declare that when Parliament meets a Liberal member of the House of Commons will move that in view of the fact that the electorate of the Dominion he's pronounced for prohibition, the Government of the country should bring down a prohibitory bill, or words to this effect. The Montreal delegates have come to the conclusion that the Government will attempt one of two things. They will either coerce the French Liberal supporters of the Administration into voting for a prohibition bill, or they will seek to induce a majority of members from the English-speaking provinces to vote down such a measure; and the long heads of the delegation appear to be pretty well convinced that the latter course will be the one adopted by Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues.

Havana, Nov. 6.—Alfred Betancourt, a British subject, born in Jamaica, was assaulted on Tuesday last by a Spanish officer, who struck him on the side of the head for wearing a gold sear pin the shape of a five-pointed star—the Cuban emblem. The officer ordered Betancourt under arrest and sent him before Gen. Arolas, Military Governor of Havana, who ordered him imprisoned. Mr Jerome, British Vice-uonsul, on being notified of the assault, presented himself at the Captain-General's palace to demand the instant release of Betancourt.

Gen. Blanco at first attempted to put Mr. Jerome off. Then he said it would be an extremely difficult matter to release the prisoner, as he had not been arrested by the Ogden Publico, but by an army officer, and had been sent to jail by the Military Governor. But Mr. Jerome maintained a firm attitude, insisting that he would remain at the palace until Betancourt was released. After an interchange of messages between General Blanco and General Arolas—Mr. Jerome all the while refusing to budge from the palace—Betancourt was released at a late hour.

Unless this demand is granted they threaten themselves to assume the protection of the railway communication between Pekin and the coast. Hoa Ching, formerly Chinese Ambassador to Russia and Germany, has been appointed a member of the Tsung-Li-Yamen.
