### THE GLOBE'S BRAVADO.

In the disgraceful squabble that is going on between The Globe and The Mail our sympathy is with the latter. The Mail has by no means an enviable reputation. Its treachery, its cowardice, its lack of principle have made The Mail a byword and a reproach, not more among Liberals than among the members of the Conservative party itself. Still any kind of an old reprobate has rights, and we think that even The Mail, in this case, has some claim to public sympathy. Why does The Globe limit its abuse to a paper that has lost its self-respect and its sense of decency? Does it presume to believe that The Mail has sunk so low in the public estimation that it will not dare to defend itself, or that if it does attempt to make a defence that the people will pay no more attention to it than it would to a criminal? Such seems to be the theory on which The Globe is proceeding. Papers that have a reputation to maintain The Globe never attacks with the Billingsgate that it periodically flings at The Mail. The World, for instance, has said harder things against The Globe than The Mail ever did, and yet this paper has never been publicly labelled as "an awful liar," or any other kind of a liar. The Globe is true to human nature. It delights to kick a man when he is down, to jump on the under dog. This abuse of The Mail is unjustifiable, because The Mail's allegations are true in substance. Even supposing they were not true, then the object of The Globe's abuse should be the paper that originated the charges and not those which merely repeated them as part of the news of the day. The source of the charges which have maddened The Globe and made it furious is The Neepawa Press, itself a Liberal paper and a supporter of the Government. The Winnipeg Telegram also asserted in plain and definite language that the Liberals who provided Mr. Sifton with The Winnipeg Free Press as a personal organ of his own were principally the gentlemen who own a controlling interest in The Globe. After these and other charges had been made and repeated in the papers out west, it is not surprising that The Mail should reproduce them. This attempt of The Globe to protect its honor by vilifying a journalistic rival with the help of a newspaper with the public. The Neepawa Press, The Winnipeg Telegram, The Winnipeg Tribune and the other papers which originated the charges are clean and respectable. Why doesn't The Globe reserve its Billingsgate for them? Or better still, why doesn't it enter an action of libel against some of the papers that are assailing it? It is trying mightily hard to save the honor that was bequeathed it by its predecessors. Why doesn't it pursue the proper course? But this charge, originated by The Neepawa Press, and reproduced by The Mail, is only a trivial incident in the indictment that has been laid against The Globe. The real charge The Globe is called upon to defend is, that, after its president and one of its shareholders, who between them control The Globe, undertook to chloroform the public, including the rank and file of the Liberal party, while the C.P.R. was allowed to run off with over three millions of the people's money, in cold cash, and while the Crow's Nesters were grabbing valuable coal fields, which to-day are estimated at one and a half million dollars, and which may be worth ten times that amount. Whether or not The Globe directorate were concerned in the purchase of The Winnipeg Free Press, with a view to secure its assistance in chloroforming the public, is a minor issue. When a prisoner is being tried for murder it is absurd to indict him for common assault. And when a man is being tried for burglary it is ridiculous for him to jump up in the court room and attempt to clear himself by shouting out "liar" to anyone who accuses him of disorderly conduct.

### CONSERVATIVE PARTY CLUBS

To Be Established in the Eastern Townships of Quebec.

Cookshire, Que., Dec. 1.—(Special).—At a meeting of the Eastern Townships Liberal Conservative Association to-day, it was decided to establish party clubs in all centres of population throughout the district, for the purpose of bringing the people into closer contact with the party, and completely in harmony with each other, to create and advance the material interests of places where these clubs are located, and to make known the principles underlying Liberal-Conservatism. Hon. G. E. Foster was present and made a speech in favor of such clubs as being especially educators of young men.

### WEST ELGIN VACATED.

One Case of Personation Proved, Making a Tie-New Election Ordered.

St. Thomas, Dec. 1.—To-day the West Elgin election trial was adjourned, in order that the West Elgin case might be disposed of. The scrutiny asked for by the Liberal candidate was proceeded with. It was shown that either there are two John Taylors, or someone has personated John Taylor. The latter idea prevailed, and, as the majority for Mr. McMillan, the Conservative member, was only one, and the returning officer could not now step in, the judges said nothing could be done but order a new election. The parties arranged to pay their own costs. The new election will probably take place early in the new year.

### East Elgin Case Closed.

The East Elgin case came to an end at 3.30 this afternoon. The judges reserved decision on the three Luton charges on the Taylor charge, on the Douglas and Barton charges, judgment to be given at Osgoode Hall on Dec. 27. The only notable incident was the evidence of young Dickinson, whom the judges threatened to send to jail for his unsatisfactory manner. The case has been fought out with great vigor by both Mr. Aylesworth, for the petitioner, and Mr. Nesbitt, for the respondent. The critical point is the agency of Luton.

### THE FAT STOCK SHOW.

Premier Hardy and Hon. John Dufferin at Breakfast—Officers Chosen by Two Associations.

Brantford, Ont., Dec. 1.—At the entertainment last evening given by the promoters of the Fat Stock Show, the Hon. A. S. Hardy occupied the chair. Mayor Raymond delivered an address of welcome to visitors, to which Hon. John Dufferin, Minister of Agriculture, replied. Addresses were also made by Mr. George McKerron of Madison, Wis.; Hon. S. Fisher, Prof. Curtis.

The attendance at the show to-day is very large and a great number are going this evening.

### OTTAWA NEWS NOTES.

Ottawa, Dec. 1.—Lord Minto and Hon. William Mulock assisted this morning in running off from the press the first Imperial penny postage stamps. The stamps will be distributed shortly, but will not be used till Christmas day.

An additional \$10,000 will be needed to continue the building of the wagon road from Edmonton to the Yukon, which has been provided by Order-in-Council.

The Nickel election case, on preliminary objections, which was decided against LeGarde, the sitting member in the Dominion Parliament, in the Supreme Court here, will be carried to the Judicial Committee of the Imperial Council.

Compared with the same month last year, there is an increase of \$285,642 in the revenue of the Customs Department for November last.

Hon. J. I. Tarte has gone to Quebec to take part in the elections there; Bagot and Montigny for the Federal House, and Beauchamp for the Local.

Major-General Huston has gone on a business expedition to New Brunswick.

Regarding the matter of tea standards, the Customs Department will follow the practice of the test by infusion, as it has done for some months past, observing the standards already adopted, and the trade will have to submit to this decision.
