POINTER FOR THE POSTMASTER-GENERAL.

There are fourteen postoffices on Yonge-street between the York Mills and Newmarket. They are all subsidiary to the Toronto office, from which their mail matter is mainly derived. The delivery service between the Toronto office and the fourteen offices on Yonge-street is in the hands of half a dozen independent contractors, in addition to the Grand Trunk Railway. It is a very mixed-up arrangement, the result being that the morning mail from Toronto reaches the different offices at all hours from eight till noon. The five offices between York Mills and Newmarket, in addition to the Grand Trunk Railway, are the following: York Mills, at half-past eleven o'clock; York Mills, at about six miles from the general postoffice. On Monday last the Postmaster-General began to operate his extension to Newmarket, so that now there are five cars a day each way between Toronto and Newmarket, passing the doors of the fourteen postoffices referred to. The Postmaster-General ought to lose no time in transferring the postal business of this portion of Yonge-street to the Electric Railway Company. A car is advertised to leave Toronto at six a.m. daily. The morning mail ought to be despatched on this car. Every office along the line would then have its mail, including the Toronto dailies, by 7.30, which is an immense improvement on the existing system.

SIXTY-SIX AND TWO-THIRDS MILLIONS.

When the demands which the Government made in Parliament during the last session are totalled up we find that the country has been committed to an expenditure of over sixty-six million dollars. A statement has been analyzed the appropriations as follows:

Supplementary, as reduced.....5,048,138
Railway subsidies.....1,000,000
Quebec bridge grant.....1,000,000
Drummond Cove.....1,000,000
Rental to Grand Trunk.....1,000,000

But the item of \$140,000 represents only one payment out of many which the country is irrevocably committed to the Grand Trunk. The rental really represents a purchase, the amount of which is \$450,000. Similarly, the \$500,000 gift to Ottawa for ten years represents a capital outlay of \$386,235. The contribution for the Pacific cable is \$2,361,000. The total charges fastened on the country during the session are therefore:

The Conservatives would have had to remain in power fifteen or twenty years for the country to have reached such an alarming expenditure.

HOUSE OF REFUGE FOR ONTARIO COUNTY.

The adjoining County of Ontario is to take a vote on the 21st inst. upon the question of erecting and furnishing a House of Refuge and purchasing a farm in connection therewith for the benefit of the poor of the county. The question has been before the people since 1894, but it has come to a head now in consequence of private donations being promised, on condition a quarter of a century ago, that if the project will cost \$25,000, the county will grant \$5000, and Mr. W. F. Cowan a site of 45 acres in the town of Oshawa. In addition to this the county possesses a grant of \$4000. What the county will be required to raise is \$12,000. The people of Ontario County have a splendid opportunity of acquiring a House of Refuge at a bargain, and they are urged to take advantage of it. This system of providing for the poor and aged has been found to be the best and most economical. In the neighborhood of 20 counties in Ontario have established a House of Refuge for the poor and aged. The cost of maintenance is in the home in Wellington, and the lowest is that of Lincoln, the figures being \$123 and \$9.83 per inmate per week. The money which it is proposed to raise in Ontario would provide a home for 75 inmates. The cost of maintenance would be \$5000.

Mr. Justice Robertson very graciously pointed out the need for the county poor-house in his address to the grand jury at Owen Sound last fall. We commend his arguments to the people of the adjoining county. Among other things he said:

He was sorry to find so large a number of persons in jail, no less than thirty people being within its walls. Of these ten or twelve are old indigent people, the poor of the county whose only crime was that they had lived too long, and become too poor to support themselves. It was a sad state of affairs in the state, the church and civilization, that the poor old people in a county possessed of so much money were cast into prison to ward with felons—in a place that was essentially intended for criminals. The County of Grey was one of the wealthiest in the province, and the people had to take care of their poor. When people become aged and have no home and no shelter, and are compelled to wander about the streets, they are taken up as vagrants, brought before the magistrate and committed to jail. Then they know they will get enough to eat to keep the body and soul together. They will prefer that course to wandering about the roads and dying in the ditches.

These people, when they are committed to jail, must be fed and clothed. They cannot be sent to hard labor, but if they have a home they are not only comfortably housed, but are able to do a good deal of work towards supporting themselves. He would not say that such an institution would be self-sustaining, but from statistics and what he had personally observed it could be made almost self-sustaining. They could work at raising vegetables, could keep cows, and do a lot of things towards the sustenance of the home. Bruce County, on one side of Grey, had done nobly, as had also Simcoe. The bones of
