

SIR EVELYN WOOD'S COMMAND.

Has Charge of 2nd Army Corps, With Headquarters But No Soldiers.

London, Oct. 10.—The Daily Mail says: The War Office states that the first and third army corps command at Aldershot and Dublin respectively will be formed from Oct. 1. Sir Evelyn Wood, who is still unexpired, while the Duke of Connaught, who has over three years unexpired, will similarly retain his command in Ireland.

GERMAN SAILOR ASSAULTED.

Trouble at Port of Spain May Make Trouble for Venezuela.

Port of Spain, Trinidad, Oct. 10.—(via Haytian cable.)—The British royal mail steamer Edinva arrived here to-day from Lagunera, Venezuela, and brought the following reliable story: Last Sunday night about 50 sailors of the German cruiser Vineta became engaged in a street row, at Porto Cabello, with the local populace. Abuse in civilian clothes followed, and the sailors, who were waiting at the wharf to take the Vineta's boat, were attacked by the police. They resisted, and the police wounded them both badly with their swords. All the Germans ashore were unharmed. The wounded sailors were carried on board the Vineta by members of the Valaisa's crew, the populace and police still attacking them with stones and sticks. The mob then tried to board the ship, but were prevented from so doing by the captain and crew of the vessel. The German consul at the place, who had signalled to the Vineta, which was in the harbor, the previous afternoon, to take the wounded sailors on board, was also attacked by the mob.
