Washington, April 11.—Undaunted by the disappointment of last Wednesday, this morning before the doors were opened. Many had camped out on the marble terraces all night, but the thousands did not begin to arrive until about 9 o'clock. The experience of last' Wednesday, when thousands who held tickets to the reserve galleries could not even get to the corridors, had resulted in better arrangements so far as the reserve galleries were concerned, and all holding tickets were accommodated. The multitude suffered, however, As on Wednesday last, many women fainted in the crush, and were carried out, and others dropped out of the

lines at the last from fatigue and exhaustion. The reserve galleries were gay with spring bonnets, and the brilliant bazarre colors which have come vogue. The President's Message in Brief. Washington, April 11.-The president's message, sent to Congress this afternoon, asks that body to authorize the president to take measures to secure a termination of hostilities in Cuba, and to secure the establishment of a stable government there, and to use the military and naval forces of the United States as may be necessary for those purposes.

The president says the only hope of relief from a condition which can no longer be endured is the enforced pacification of the island. The issue is now with congress, and he awaits its action, standing prepared to carry out every obligation imposed on him by the constitution.
