Other buildings within a radius of a block were damaged, bomb fragments penetrating doors and breaking windows. The Telegram has been strongly pro-ally, and is one of Ohlo's foremost "dry" advocates. Several years ago an attempt was made to dynamite the home of its publisher, Samuel G. McClure.

SECOND FRENCH ARMY WILL ENTER METZ


