Bakery Regulations.

The new regulations governing bakeries were submitted and approved, these recommending the wrapping of bread, but not making it compulsory.

The statement was made by Dr. W. S. Downham, M. O. H., that he had been informed that wrapped bread would cost a cent a loaf more. The larger bakeries favored it, but the smaller ones considered that it involved too great difficulties.

difficulties.

The added cost of wrapping was the point which carried most weight with the board re refusing to make wrapping ompulsory.
The regulations provide for absolute-y sanitary conditions in bakeries, which will be under the eye of in-

spectors;
One point to which Mrs. W. S. Part-ridge drew attention was the section:
"No person who has any communicable disease or any communicable skin dis-ease shall work in any bakery, and no ease shall work in any bakery, and no owner, manager or person in charge of any bakery shall knowingly require, permit or suffer such person to be em-ployed in his bakery." Mrs. Partridee wanted to know if employees were inwanted to know it employees were inspected. There was much more menace to the public, she said, from employees in bakeries suffering from communicable diseases, than from unwrapped bread. Dr. Downham stated that up to the present there has not been such in-

bread. Dr. Downham stated that up to the present there has not been such inspection.

Copies of the new regulations will be sent to all the bakers in the city.

Tuberculosis Leads.

The report of contagious diseases presented by Dr. Downham showed that tuberculosis had a big lead in the communicable diseases reported during January. 32 cases in all. Diphtheria came second with 24 cases, and chickenpox followed up with 19 cases. Suspected diphtheria and scarlet fever broke even, 8-cases each. Only one case of smallpox appeared and since that was some ten days ago. Dr. Downham expressed the opinion that it wasn't likely to spread any farther.

Commenting in her report upon the frequent misleading characters of reports owing to tardy registration of deaths, etc. Miss Jennie Fidlar, assistant in vital statistics at the Institute of Public Health asked sanction of the board for keeping cheek on deaths and biths, with newspaper notices and other reports of deaths, sickness, etc., and to give a part of one day a week to this work, the time to be principally spent at the city hail. Advantages pointed out were that welfare nurses could be notified of births at once and famigations necessary be promptly reported, etc. It was decided to leave decision over until the next meeting.

The permission of the council will be asked for the use of the room on the third floor of the city hall, formerly used by the London Social Service Council, as an office for Miss Friend, public health nurse, a telephone to be installed.


