GRIDDLE CAKES.

"Well, what would you like for sup-
per tonight?" "Griddle-cakes." In how
many homes, if this question were put,
would not the prompt answer come?
Griddle-cakes have been held high in
the esteem of the small boy, and of the
grown man, too, for that matter, as
long as any of us can remember. Per-
haps the ingredients vary, perhaps the
fact remains that the big plate of hot,
crisp cakes with butter and maple
syrup, or corn syrup, poured over them,
continues to be food fit for gods.
The despoiler thinks they are to be
shunned, and so they are by him, but
food experts have said that they need
not be indigestible for the fortunate
normal person. They should be light
and hot, and not eaten too fast. If
these precautions are taken, there can
be no doubt that griddle cakes are a
rich, palatable, nourishing food, worthy
of a place on the table.

Sour Milk Griddle Cakes—One egg,

two cups of sour milk, two and a half
cups of flour, one-half teaspoonful
of salt, one and a quarter spoonfuls of
soda, mix and sift the flour, salt, and
soda. Beat the egg, add it to the milk,
and stir into them the dry ingredients.
Beat well. Drop on a hot griddle, until
puffed, full of bubbles, and brown
on the edges. Turn with a quick move-
ment, cook under, and serve at once
with butter and syrup.
Bread Griddle Cakes—A cupful and a
half of stale bread crumbs, a cupful and
a half of scalded milk, half a cupful of
flour, half a teaspoonful of salt, one
teaspoonful of butter substitute, two
eggs, and two and a half level teaspoon-
fuls of baking powder. Scald the crumbs
in half the milk and let them cool. Mix
the other dry ingredients, and combine
with the eggs well-beaten, the cooled
crumbs, and the rest of the milk. Melt
the butter substitute, and pour it into
the mixture. Cook as above, for sour
milk cakes.

WHAT'S IN A NAME

BELLE.

Belle is one of the many feminine
names which began existence as a
contraction, and gained sturdy inde-
pendence until it became a recognized
appellative and is bestowed without re-
ference to its prefix.

Since Belle signifies "beauty of Baal,"
it is easily discernible that it is an
offspring of Isabelle. In the days when
Elizabeth of France married Philip-
pe Auguste and suffered her name to
be changed to Isabelle by the French,
it is hardly likely that Belle was
used, either as an endearment or a
diminutive. But Isabelle became very
popular in royal circles, and the be-
trothed of Hugues de Lusignan, who
later married King John, brought Is-
abelle to England.

It was there that Belle came into
existence and into consequent popu-
larity. Of all the contractions of Isabelle—
of which Nib, Nibel, and Nib are a few
examples—Belle proved the most popu-
lar and lasting.

Belle is a popular form in this coun-
try, and is bestowed without reference
to Isabelle. France recognizes no such
contraction, but Spain has an equiv-
alent Belle.

The opal is the gem assigned to
Belle. It will prove a talisman against
evil, danger and disease when worn
by her. The evil designs of the pixie,
which superstition claims is implem-
ented in the stone, will be powerless
against her. To dream of an opal
means success on Friday. Belle's lucky
day, and 4 her lucky number. The

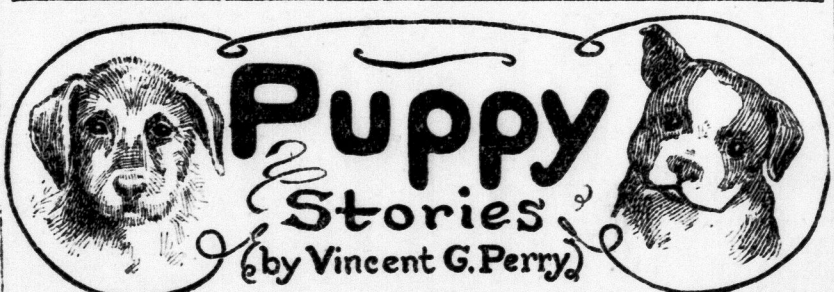
