BANDITS ATTACK FARMER AND GET LIQUOR SUPPLY

Sandwich Resident Is Badly Beaten by Motor Car Thugs.

WINDSOR, July 25.—In spite of the vigorous chase taken here to curb rum running and illicit traffic in liquor, the situation along the border within the past few days has taken a startling new turn of violence. For the second time within 24 hours, hand-to-hand fighting broke out between the home of Sandwich West Township farmer early Saturday morning, and after beating him severely and threatening his life, together with that of his son and two women occupants of the house, left with a stock of liquor.

The first raid, made at dawn Friday morning, was at the home of Albert Melche, where five men, thought to be from Detroit, drove up in an automobile, and opened a fusillade of bullets at the house, shattering the windows. Melche and his son put up a spirited defence, however, and before provincial police officers summoned by telephone, reached the scene.

Just as Eli Gerard, a farmer residing on the Huron Line was loading up his truck at the rear of his home, previous to coming to the Windsor market with a load of garden produce, he saw the five men, who were carrying with them a barrel of whiskey and a case of gin.

Gerard, who in the arms carried by the bandits, made a game fight for his liquor, was badly beaten up, and drove to the city some time later with his head swathed in bandages, and laid a complaint with the provincial police, who are now working on both cases, but with no clue in either to guide them in establishing the identity of the men responsible for the outrages.

CLOTH SHOPS BURN; LOSS ABOUT \$10,000,000

LOMBAY, India, July 25.—Two thousand Indian cloth shops in the heart of Bombay and the biggest cloth market in India, were destroyed by fire Friday night. The loss is estimated at thirty millions of rupees at least (about \$10,000,000).

No casualties are reported. The cause of the fire is not known.

LOVE'S CONFESSION BELIEVED BY COURT AND FURTHER ACTION SUGGESTED

Grey County Youth Sticks To Startling Admission, But the Attorney-General's Investigation Shows Prisoner an Epileptic—Medical Specialists Think He Has Imagined Himself a Murderer.

TORONTO, July 25.—Arnold Love's startling confession that it was he, not his father, Henry Love, who killed Mrs. Henry Love in Grey County, and for which murder his father was hanged seven years ago, has been investigated by the attorney-general's department. As a result of the investigation it is thought nothing further will be done in the matter.

Arnold, who was about fourteen years of age at the time of the murder, is an epileptic and in the opinion of specialists in mental disease he has imagined himself the murderer. The circumstances do not bear him out in his remarkable story. Love was in Toronto today and stuck to his "confession" and Rev. G. N. Sharpe, the evangelist, to whom Arnold Love is unbearably attached, at a revival meeting on Saturday, stated that he believed the confession genuine.

Arnold Love, even in maturity, is small of stature and slight build, and the authorities find it difficult to credit his story that as a boy of fourteen years he dragged his mother's body into an excavation with a cellar and lifted it over some scantlings five feet in height and deposited it in the hole in which it was found. His mother was of large build. Other details of the murder do not seem to fit in with Arnold's story.

Dr. Eric Clark of this city, son of Dr. C. K. Clarke of the Canadian National Committee For Mental Hygiene, in an interview said an epileptic would be prone to have such hallucinations. Dr. Harvey Clare of the Reception Hospital, expressed a similar opinion.

STRUCK MOTHER IN BOVISH TEMPER, IS LOVE'S ADMISSESION

TORONTO, July 24.—Rev. G. N. Sharpe, the evangelist, to whom Arnold Love is said to have made the startling statement that he was the murderer of his mother, for which crime his father was hanged seven years ago, is in this city today. Mr. Sharpe says that he had said to him: "Her blood is on my head."

Telling the story of Arnold Love's admission of his guilt, Mr. Sharpe says: "On the last night of the revival meetings, a young man said he had come to the meeting and was converted, and talked about wanting to make a confession. I said: 'Well, perhaps you should, and perhaps you shouldn't. There are some things which should, and others which should not be confessed, and you must decide for yourself.'"

"I said: 'If you have wronged anybody you ought to make it right. I did not coax it out of him, but he said: 'Well, I have been an awful sinner, Mr. Sharpe, and I want you to pray for me.'"

"I did not know then the young man's name or anything about him. He said: 'I feel my own mother's blood lies on me.' I asked in what way. 'Well,' he said, 'I guess I struck the fatal blow and killed my mother.'"

"That was about all he said to me that night. I had an interview with him several days later. He said he felt that he would like to come right out and confess and give himself up. He came down to Toronto, a week ago last Tuesday, and had an interview with the attorney-general without giving any names."

A report is also circulated here that H. Dewar, K.C., has been requested to look after Love's interests, following representations by Rev. Mr. Carten, pastor of the Precinct Methodist Church.

Friends of Arnold Love say that he is somewhat underdeveloped mentally and had never been in a big city and had never ridden in a street car or an elevator.

In Boyish Feud. Continuing his story of Arnold Love's confession, Mr. Sharpe said: "Arnold told me that his mother and he had been in a boyish feud for some time. This morning he was anxious to get to school to have some fun. His mother ordered him to bring some wood and water. He threw down his school bag in a temper, got the wood, and on a returning way, an angry, saw his mother standing over him. Turning suddenly he struck her in a temper, with one of the pieces of wood, never knowing the effect it would have. When she fell, he scarcely knew what to do. He lifted the school bag from the table, and what followed he has a scarcely clear idea."

"As regards experiences before the trial," stated Mr. Sharpe, "he said that the detectives had questioned him in an alarming manner, shouting at him. They said to the boy, according to his story, 'You know you father killed your mother. If you do not tell us what you know there is only one thing to do and that is put you in jail.' The boy answered that it was his father who did it, knowing that it was untrue, but never thinking that his father would hang for it. Then when the trial came he thought he must say the same."

CANNOT BELIEVE IN ARNOLD LOVE'S STORY OF DOUBLE CRIME

[Special to The Advertiser.] OWEN SOUND, July 25.—Did Arnold Love murder his mother and allow his father to go to the gallows for the crime which he himself had committed, is the question in everybody's mind here. The boy's story is so startling that it is unbelievable that such a thing could be done by a boy of 14, as Arnold Love was the murderer of his mother. But if credence is to be placed on his story told to Rev. G. N. Sharpe there can be no doubt of his guilt of the double crime.

The young man now states that it was he who, in a fit of anger, hit his mother over the head with a stick of wood and dragged her body down into the cellar. All through the investigation which followed the murder and all through the trial he did speak even when his father mounted the scaffold here in Owen Sound and said the death penalty for a crime of which he affirmed his innocence right until the last.

Only after being touched by the preaching of Rev. G. N. Sharpe of Belleville at a revival meeting in the Methodist Church at Salem, near Priceville, about three weeks ago, does the son speak.

No charge has as yet been laid against the young man, Arnold Love. The whole matter is in the hands of the attorney-general's department, with which Rev. Mr. Sharpe took up the matter at the young man's request. Love is at present in Toronto, where he will be examined by an alienist. Efforts are already being made to save the young man, who has now come forward of his own accord in a desire to right a great wrong, so far as is possible. Those who are acting in his behalf are Rev. G. N. Sharpe of Belleville, to whom the young man made the confession; Rev. Mr. McCarty, Methodist minister at Priceville; Dr. Murray of Fleetwood, and two or three Owen Sound friends.

FARMERS WILL NOT FORM POOL TO SELL WHEAT

Alberta Official Says They Will Sell Crops Themselves, if Necessary.

PREFER WHEAT BOARD

If the Government Will Not Market Grain, Farmers Will Try To Do So.

CALGARY, July 24.—No co-operative farmers' pool will be established in Alberta this year should the Dominion Government not see fit to continue the Canada Wheat Board for the handling of the 1920 crop. This was the statement of H. W. Wood, president of the United Farmers of Alberta, Saturday morning upon his return to the city after addressing a number of local organizations in the Edmonton district.

"Farmers have never asked for a pool for this year's crop," he said. "They want the wheat board to be continued. If the Government will not do this then they desire to begin to make efforts to sell their wheat themselves."

No one hopes that they would be able to complete a pool at once."

Mr. Wood stated that the executive of the United Farmers of Alberta had merely suggested the organization of a pool. "We still want the board," he emphasized.

Following the confession after the evangelist meetings in Salem, Rev. Mr. Sharpe and others, including an Owen Sound man, took the matter up with the attorney-general's department. Arnold Love was brought to Owen Sound last Thursday night by W. A. Stringer of the attorney-general's department and after being lodged for the night in the jail, was taken to Toronto the next afternoon.

He was met at the station by Rev. Mr. McCarty and local men, who talked with him. No statement was expressed with his desire to atone for his great sin.

SENDING MORE ARMS AND MEN INTO BELFAST

Military Busiest Body in City Sunday, Throwing Up Barricades.

MORE WIRE ERECTED

Two Residences and Spirit Shops Looted—Death List Reaches 17.

BELFAST, July 25.—(By the Associated Press.)—The military, which is being steadily reinforced, not only by men, but by armored cars, the latter for the present being kept in barracks, was the busiest body in Belfast today for, although a steady downpour of rain gave hope that the enthusiasm of the rioters would dampen, the authorities were working no chances.

Barricades in the disturbed sections were strengthened with further bags, more wire was erected and more men were added to the pickets, including more seasoned soldiers. The precautions were not ill-timed, for early this afternoon another saloon in Falls road district was wrecked and the premises of certain hardware merchants met a similar fate.

SOME WINDOW SMASHING.

BELFAST, July 25.—There was no firing here last night or this morning and the worst disturbance was some window smashing. The death list as a result of the recent fighting between the Unionists and Sinn Féin factions reached seventeen today, when two women, who were injured Friday in the attack on St. Mark's convent, and a man who was shot Thursday, died.

The looting of two residences and a spirit shop in Ballymacarret, a suburb of Belfast, Saturday night was done by a crowd of youths, encouraged by women and girls, who were being driven about the district by the police in an effort to disperse them. After the furniture of the residences and the stock of the spirit shop had been looted, the police drove a baton charge served to drive the looters home. The soldiers, refrained from firing their rifles, but the youths were attacked with stones and bottles and an occasional revolver shot.

There was also a local fight between the two factions in the Falls road district, the only sufferers being police who were injured. Two of their number were wounded.

At Bangor and Lisburn, both within a ten-mile radius of Belfast, where many workers of Belfast reside, saloons and pawnbrokers were the chief sufferers. The crowds attacked such places indiscriminately. After considerable difficulty the police and military restored order without the use of firearms.

WRECKAGE OF CAR EMPHASIZES NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

INGERSOLL, July 25.—It was stated today that Mr. Frank A. McCarty, of London, who is a patient at Alexandra Hospital because of injuries received in a motor accident on the Tillamook road, near Mount Elgin, Friday night, are doing as well as could be expected. The wrecked automobile was brought to a local garage yesterday and its condition emphasized the narrow escape which its occupants had from death.

C. P. E. WILL OPERATE WESTERN RAILWAY

Edmonton, July 25.—According to Premier Stewart, who returned to Montreal yesterday morning with Attorney-General Boye, the C. P. E. is to control and operate the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway for a period of five years, they taking an option to purchase the line at any time within that period. "The C. P. E. will then have full control of the operation of the road."
