Judgment (H.). By the judgment appealed from the plaintiffs are allowed to receive as a preferential claim out of the estate of Hallman, \$322.30 That is all they are entitled to. As to costs, the action might well have been dismissed with costs, because of the want of provincial license, which was not yet produced at the hearing of this appeal and the plaintiffs cannot well complain that the action was dismissed with costs on other ground. The production of the certificate now should not affect the question of costs. It would be useless to modify the judgment at the trial, as the plaintiffs are getting by the undertaking of the defendant all they are entitled to. Appeal dismissed with costs.


