GILDING BROTHERS BURIED

The bodies of the two Gilding Brothers, Joseph and Hunter, who so tragically met death in the bay a week ago, were interred in Mount Pleasant Cemetery yesterday afternoon, the funeral taking place from the home of their parents, 67 Cecil-street.

At the time of the departure of the cortege from the house the street was blocked with sympathetic friends, and a company of the Queen's Own with the aid of a couple of police officers were lined up to maintain a passage between the house and the curb. A brief service was held in the house, led by Rev. J. H. Van Horn, pastor of Christ's Church, "Nearer My God to Thee" was sung and Miss Flossie McNeice sang a solo. The two coffins were nearly covered with flowers, and across that of Hunter, whose company saw active service in South Africa, the red ensign with the Canadian coat of arms was draped. There were many beautiful floral offerings. A "Gates Ajar" from the Toronto Fire Department and a wreath from the Portland-street fire station, of which Joseph was a member, were remarkably pretty. The workmen at the G.T.R. car shops, where John Gilding, father of the boys, is employed, also sent a beautiful wreath.

About seventy-five members of the fire department, headed by Deputy Chief Apple, accompanied the two hearses to the graveside, and F. O. party of the Queen's Own also afforded an escort. Quite a few carriages bearing friends of the young men also joined the procession. The chief mourners were the aged father and mother of the young men, bowed down with grief in the loss of their last two children.
