Submarines Continue Ravages in North Sea and Mediterranean. MINE SWEEPER SUNK. British Admiralty Announces Loss of Clacton in Levant.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Six more merchantmen and a British mine sweeper have been sunk by submarines, according to a later advice received here tonight. Four of these merchant vessels and the mine-sweeper were destroyed in the Mediterranean.

Admiralty announced today that the British mine sweeper Clacton was torpedoed and sunk in the Levant on Aug. 5. Five members of the crew are missing and five others are wounded.
