DISMISS APPEALS MADE BY CRESCENT CREAMERY CO.

Ottawa, June 2.—W. F. O'Connor, acting chairman of the board of commerce, received information from Winnipeg this morning that the appeal court of Manitoba had dismissed the appeals made by the Crescent Creamery Company of Winnipeg from convictions of breach of board of commerce orders dealing with profits upon the sale of milk. Counsel for the board of commerce and the City of Ottawa have paid the costs of the board of commerce investigation into milk conditions in Winnipeg. Mr. O'Connor said the terms of the board's orders against these companies having been complied with, the board rescinds the order.

CATTLE MARKET WAS UP A GOOD 25 CENTS

New High Prices Made on Local Exchange.

With a run of around 800 fresh cattle the market for all classes of cattle was active and strong, with prices all around a good 25c up over the early part of the week, and that was a good market, too. We have had a strong week, with comparatively light receipts, and this had had the effect of creating a strong undertone. Then, too, the drovers coming in from all parts of the country report dry, hot weather, with prospects of a shortage of pasture if this thing continues. Without going over the list, it is enough to say that there was a good clean-up and at satisfactory prices to the drovers anyway.

In the small stuff the traders report little change in the sheep, lambs and calves, with quotations practically unchanged.

Some prices called off a little, the packers and buyers generally leading on the basis of 15c to the farmer, 18c to the city, and 19c to the drover, and the city butchers were paying from 25c to 50c higher over these prices.

SOME MARKET NOTES.

A Wonderful Sale.

The sale by the commission house of McDonald & Halligan yesterday of 4 steers, averaging 1250 lbs., and another one 1270 lbs., at \$18.40, practically constituted a new record on the local exchange for this number of cattle. The steers were from the W. R. Y. of Turnberry township, Bluevale P.O., shipped in by Wm. Stinson of G.O. and sold to Arnold Bros. at the price named, \$18.40, for this kind of trade.

Choice cattle of this kind reflect credit upon everybody connected with the transaction.

The sale of Canadian Aberdeen Angus cattle, held under the auspices of the association and sold by the Yorkton, yesterday was a decided success, good prices being realized.

Some of the best known breeders in Canada were represented and the bidding was spirited. In all 57 heifers, cows and bulls were offered, and 50 were sold at the highest price paid, \$800, was for "Idealist of Malvern" (imp.), a two-year-old bull, consigned by the Yorkton.

The females ranged around from \$300 to \$400 and \$450 and were largely retained in Ontario. The sales prove that the Aberdeen Angus, as beef cattle, are rapidly growing in favor.

Syracuse, N. Y., June 2.—The John A. Roberts Corporation of Utica, dealing in wearing apparel, were today fined \$55,000 by Federal Judge Harland B. Howe, following their conviction of profiteering on 11 counts.

WINNIPEG CATTLE RECEIPTS.

Winnipeg, June 2.—(Dominion live stock receipts today were 740 cattle, 1077 hogs and 51 sheep. The market for good quality butcher stuff was steady, with choice butcher steers ranging from \$16 to \$18; female butchers of choice quality changed hands at \$13 to \$14.

The stocker and feeder trade was dull, the market being firm from 25c to 50c weaker, majority of sales being at \$7 to \$8 for good quality stuff.

The hog market was steady at \$22 for select, fed and watered.

MEAGRE RECEIPTS SEND CORN HIGHER

Delay in Planting Another Bullish Influence—Oats Are Also Strong.

Chicago, June 2.—Material fresh upturn in the price of corn resulted today from continued failure of railroad efforts to enlarge receipts here. The close was unsettled, but 2c to 2½c net higher, with July \$1.75 to \$1.76½ and Sept. \$1.81½ to \$1.81½. Oats gained 1½c to 1¾c. In provisions the outcome ranged from 20c decline to a rise of 12c.

Announcement that only 35 cars of corn had arrived immediately and persistent buying on the part of big commission houses, the advance which prices quickly showed was soon given further impetus thru a report that the 1920 grain season was uniformly ten to twenty days late in all the states that as a rule have surplus crops. Besides, in some important sections, where planting of corn still remained to be done, excessive moisture was threatening additional delay. Word of liberal new export business in wheat tended subsequently to prevent any notable reaction in the corn market, also profit-taking sales reached considerable volume at times.

Oats, like corn, appeared to be chiefly influenced by the lack of a firm movement of supplies to distributing centers. Provisions were somewhat depressed.
