SCYTHES OPPOSED

Polish Army Outnumbered Like Belgium, is Fighting Hard.

The apparently uninterrupted march of the Bolsheviki army from one suc-cess to another is due, not to their outstanding military genius, so much as to the fact that the Poles are unable to oppose them with anything like a similar military equipment. Thousands of Poles have rushed to the defence of the colors and many of these newly-formed regiments have gone forward to meet the oncoming tide of militaristic Bolshevism armed only with scythes. Patriotic fervor is an admirable quality to manifest it-self in the people of a country, but it will unfortunately not take the

Glaring headlines announce the fall of great fortresses—Brest-Litovsk. Rowno, Dubno and others—where, as flow of military campaigns during the past six years have completely obliterated them, and the Polish government had not been able to restore them. These so-called fortress cities were as undefended by a system of fortifications as any peaceful Canadian vil-

Therefore, it will be seen that with tremendously superior numbers, all well armed, and with no fortifications to bar their way, the Bolsheviki army has not won its way by the exercise of marvelously superior military prowess. The valiant little Belgian army threw itself across the path of the German advance. All their valor and "will to die" could not check the armed horde thrown ,against , them. The Belgian army was an efficient, intensely patriotic military organization, equipped as well as any army in Europe, yet they were compelled to yield—stubbornly, we know—to the

overwhelming army of Germany.

Poles Inadequately Equipped.

The Polish army inadequately equipped, many of its volunteer corps carrying only scythes, have more than equaled the valorous stand of the Belgians. Germany, ever watchful for an opportunity to compound the prob-lems of the allies and curry the favor with the Bolsheviki, has declared her neutrality in any concerted action which may be taken to assist Poland by the entente. She stands as a great

obstacle between Poland and her sorely needed military supplies.

Owing to the international complications, which render the status of Dantzic somewhat obscure, altho she was plainly designated as Poland's gateway to the sea by the great peace conference, it is only very lately that it has been possible for the Polishgovernment to bring munitions thru

Thanks to the propaganda of the Prussian junkers and the Bolshevist agitators, who make common cause in their hatred of Poland, the German dock workers at Dantzic have refused to unload munitions, brought there by the ships of the allies, for the use of the Polish army: This condition, however, has been in a measure, remedied by the women of Poland, who have volunteered to unload these ships.
