HAYES WILL GIVE ROOSEVELT A STICK

Memento of Marathon Victory Cut in Ireland and Named by Richard Croker.

President Roosevelt will soon receive what is probably the most effective "big stick" he ever held in his hands—a gigantic Irish shillelagh, which was cut in Tipperary, Ireland, by John J. Hayes, winner of the London Marathon.

The weapon weighs 20 pounds, is about a foot and a half long, mounted in silver and suitably inscribed. This inscription which the young American won against the world, "The Marathon Big Stick."

Young Hayes was riding in a jaunty car when he saw the root growing, and he decided that it was too fine a specimen to pass by.

The need and advisability of procuring a garbage incinerator for the city was also discussed. It was felt that such a thing would be a great boon for the community and would also lessen the necessary work of inspection by the board officers.

How to Keep Bread and Cake

In order to keep baked things from becoming stale, it is necessary to keep them in a cool, dry place. Things hot from the oven need to be set on a folded cloth, any solid surface covered with a clean, dry cloth, and the steam from the oven kept off.

Afterwards come the breadbox or crumple bag, with a tight-fitting cover and good lining. Line it inside with a length of good linen cloth, wide enough to reach around the bottom and wide enough to stretch over a boxful of loaves.

Success—Scrape, wash and score in quarter-inch slices a quarter of a pound of salt pork. Cover with boiling water and let simmer five or six hours, or until nearly tender.
