We have been politely favoured with the loan of a Liverpool paper of the 17th ult. from which we have made several extracts. No new light having been thrown on Eastern affairs, we have no materials for remark arising from that source. Indeed the state of Ireland seems by latest accounts, to be exciting the greatest share of attention and interest in the Parent State. Associations, Clubs, Meetings, &c. are the all engrossing objects. Agitation is still kept alive, but the MARQUIS OF ANGLESEA'S Proclamation has undoubtedly had a certain effect in subduing the turbulence and softening the tone of the one party, and in conciliating the regards of the other. There seems however to be one subject on which all parties in and out of Parliament are agreed, and that is that the country cannot long remain in its present highly feverish state. Some remedy must be applied, but that remedy the most skillful State physician has not as yet been able decidedly to prescribe. It is evident that security and pacification are both required, but what kind of application can be proposed that will answer the ends of the one as well as of the other? In some form or other, we have reason to believe, Emancipation will be resorted to; but by what auxiliary or checking measures it is proposed to accompany it has not yet transpired. The concerting and maturing of these constitutes indeed the chief difficulty in the case; and however doubtful or problematical that difficulty might have been formerly, we have now—fortunately or unfortunately we know not—only to revert to the occurrences of the last few months, to see it in its full and appalling magnitude.

We had occasion to state some time ago, and we have no reason to alter one iota of the statement now, that it cannot be shown that the want of Emancipation is the exciting cause of the disaffection. To attribute misery to particular circumstances is one thing, but to be miserable because of these circumstances, is quite another; and it is by no means a miracle in history to find a people groaning under physical evils, and blaming for these evils, some imaginary theoretical deprivation to which their attention has been directed by the designing or the ignorant. The misery of the great mass of the Irish population arises from certain moral causes; it consists in their depressed circumstances; it is these which incline them to disaffection—and the cry and ferment about Emancipation, only illustrate with what ease a general rising may be got up, against any supposed grievance, so long as those causes exist which Emancipation can never remove.

In making these cursory remarks, we are influenced by no feelings of hostility either to the persons or tenets of those whose claims have given rise to so much discussion. We speak of things as they are, and the effects of particular measures as they would be, were they carried into action. At the same time we would be glad, as we formerly said, if some dextrous Bill could be introduced, which would ensure such a compromise as would be consistent at once with the great ends of security to the Constitution, and peace to the Kingdom at large.

We do not at present discover any ground on which to apprehend a general war in Europe, as some of our contemporaries have been foreboding. It is one of the distinguishing excellencies of our reigning Monarch, that he is disposed to maintain peace in his own dominions, and to cultivate habits of amity with surrounding nations.

We observe with much regret the announcement of the death of the QUEEN OF WILHEMBERG.

FROM the aspect of American papers received this morning, we gather, that the Election of General JACKSON is all but officially declared. The Boston Patriot says, "he seems to have carried the West by acclamation;" and "that he will be the next President must now be considered beyond the reach of any human contingency."

CONCERT AT MASONIC HALL.—Last evening Mr. KEENE is giving his parting Concert, succeeded in gratifying a very respectable assemblage of Ladies and Gentlemen, by his own unaided efforts in the vocal department; and it must be admitted that the task is not an easy one, when the general thirst for novelty and variety is taken into account. It might be injudicious to make distinctions, or to particularise, where all were so pleasing, but it will be generally conceded, that he shone most in "The Moon on the Lake," and "Blue Bonnets over the Border," and, as might be expected, was quite at home with his "Croskeen Lawn." It was matter of regret that Mr. WARREN, who had so handsomely volunteered his services on the occasion, should have been condemned to perform on so miserable an instrument. We trust that for once Mr. KEENE would be in some measure rewarded for his exertions, and that the time is not far distant when it will cease to be the reproach of this community, that while Theatres, Assemblies, Horse Races, &c. are resorted to in crowds, the rational and innocent amusement of a Concert, is suffered to languish for want of ordinary patronage and encouragement. The character of St. John in this particular, is now become so notorious that the Female Vocalists at present performing with such success and eclat in Halifax, and whose appearance here we were led to expect, have been deterred from making even one attempt in this place in the line of their profession.

ATLANTIC SOUVENIR.—We have lately had put into our hands an additional volume of the American work bearing the above title, which is intended as a Christmas or New-Year's Offering for 1829. We are humbly of opinion that it maintains the reputation already acquired by that publication. The stories are interesting, particularly to the inhabitants of America—the poetry is in some instances very beautiful—the engravings do great honour to the artist—and the book is got up in a style highly creditable to the American press. Of the poetical department we present two specimens to-day in our poets' corner, and next week we propose to exhibit one or two more.

ALARM OF FIRE.—Last Evening our Citizens were alarmed by the cry of Fire.—The cause was owing only to the circumstance of a chimney in the store of Mr. T. G. HATHEWAY taking fire. It was however got under with little difficulty, and without any damage done to the premises.—Courier.

PROSPECTUS Of the Nova-Scotia Baptist Education Society, and of the Literary and Theological Institution to be connected therewith. IT is universally admitted that Education has a powerful influence on the interests of Religion, and the well being of individuals and society.—In this Province a wide field is open for exertion, with reference to this object; and the Baptists, as forming a very large portion of the population, are called on to engage in this good work, with energy proportioned to the advantages in prospect; and earnestly to seek the Divine Blessing upon an undertaking bearing a close relation to the most important interests of man.—Two leading objects are to be regarded: the primary one, in a religious point of view, is the providing suitable instruction, within the reach of young men, who feel themselves called to the ministry of the Gospel; the second object, of vast importance in itself, and in the present state of the country, essential to the attainment of the first, is to establish a good Seminary for the general instruction of youth, so situated as to afford as much facility of communication with the various sections of the Province as possible; and wherein the course of instruction, and the manner of boarding and tuition shall be adapted to the state of that part of the Province which has the greatest number of wealthy, nor the time of the youth occupied with pursuits but little calculated to fit them for the stations of life which they have the prospect of filling. For the purpose of compassing these objects, it is proposed: 1. That a Society be formed, to be called The Nova Scotia Baptist Education Society. 2. That all persons paying an annual subscription of twenty shillings and upwards, or making a donation of ten pounds or upwards, shall be Members of the Society. 3. That the funds of the Society will be appropriated to the two main objects: first, to establish a suitable Seminary of Learning; and secondly, to afford pecuniary assistance to indigent young men called to preach the Gospel, for the purpose of enabling them to obtain instruction. 4. That a general meeting of the Society be held annually. 5. That there be appointed a President, two Vice Presidents, two Secretaries, and a Committee of Management. 6. That the Board of Directors be chosen at the annual meeting of the Society; and the officers and Committee of Management be chosen by the Board of Directors. 7. That of the Board of Directors, ten, at least, shall be ordained Baptist Ministers, and two thirds of the whole number, at least, regular Members of Baptist Churches in connection with the Nova Scotia Baptist Association. 8. That the Committee of Management shall consist of, at least, seven, and not more than twelve Members, of whom more than one half shall be regular Members of Baptist Churches in connection with the Nova Scotia Baptist Association. 9. That the Board of Directors shall hold, at least, one meeting every year, to consult on the affairs of the Society, ascertain and report its state and progress, review the proceedings and reports of the Committee, and make such general regulations as may be found proper for the advancement of the objects of the Society, and the government of the Committee. 10. That as soon as means are obtained, the Society will establish and maintain a Seminary for the instruction of youth, under the direction and government of the Committee, subject to the supervision and control of the Board of Directors. 11. That the principal object to be observed in the management of the Institution, being, to adapt the course of study to the state of society, and the wants of the people, and to place the means of instruction, as much as possible within the reach of all persons, it is considered primarily necessary to attend to those branches of Education which are of more general use at the same time that a wider range of literary acquirements shall be open to those who may have the ability to seek them, or to whose prospects in life they may be more suitably adapted. It is also considered desirable that as far as may be practicable, persons wishing to qualify themselves for the various callings of life, should have opportunity to receive instruction at their leisure seasons in the year, in the particular branches of study, more immediately requisite for their respective objects. With these principles in view, it is proposed that this Institution shall afford the means of instruction in the usual branches of English Literature, and of scientific, classical, and modern studies, which usually comprise the course of Education at an Academy and College. It will, however, be the business of the Committee to exercise their discretion from time to time, in adopting or discontinuing such branches of the course of study as circumstances may require or render expedient, and progressively, as the funds of the Society shall permit, to adapt this Institution to answer all the ends above proposed. Provided, however, 12. That the Committee and Board of Directors, that part who shall be members of Baptist Churches, in connection with the Nova Scotia Baptist Association, shall have the sole regulation of the Theological Department in the Seminary. 13. That it be the care of the Committee to provide efficient Teachers for this Seminary, to whose moral and religious character special regard will be had; and it is considered an object in every department under the influence of the Society, never to be lost sight of, that the scholars and students, while acquiring information to fit them for their various stations in life, should be led to a knowledge of the true relation of man to his Creator, and of that faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, which alone can furnish a sure pledge of their good conduct in this world, and their happiness in eternity. 14. That the Seminary be open to children, and persons of any religious denomination. 15. That to the attainment of the objects of the Institution, it is essentially requisite that the whole system should be conducted upon a principle of the most strict and simple Economy, and no distinctions among the scholars and students, arising from wealth or external circumstances, permitted to appear; the scholars will, as soon as practicable, be boarded at the Institution; and it is thought advisable to connect with the establishment a farm, under the care of some respectable person, for the supply of articles of provision for the use of the School, and for affording an opportunity of employing the Boys during a portion of their leisure time, in beautiful labour; by which they may obtain exercise, acquire a habit of industry, and be less exposed to the irregularities which result from unemployed seasons of leisure. The diet and dress of the scholars in this world, and their happiness in eternity, will be regulated by the Committee, and made known as part of the terms of the school, to be conform'd to without exception. 16. The terms of Tuition and Board to be fixed at as low a rate as possible. 17. The Funds for purchase of land, erection of buildings, and the various expenses incident to the

commencement of the undertaking, as well as those which may attend its annual support, to be obtained by donations and annual contributions. 18. The Subscription Lists to be divided into several columns, by which the annual contributions may be kept separate from the Donations; and persons making Donations may distinguish the particular object to which they wish the Donations to be exclusively applied; the Annual Contributions and Donations not expressly limited, to be appropriated by the Committee, as it shall see most fit for the general advancement of the objects of the Society. The Officers of the Society, for the present year, as chosen by the Association and by the Committee, under the sanction of the Association. President—Rev. Edward Manning. Vice Presidents—Rev. Chas.
