would be able to speak of the place or recommend it to friends joining the church. Members of the Board are now regularly appointed to attend there at both services,—the same as in the body of the church in order to assist strangers in selecting pews or sittings.

During the past year the congregation has experienced many sore trials and bereavements and the Board has lost two of its useful members.

The Trustees may here be permitted to record the great loss to them caused by the death of the late Chief William Patton, so long identified with the work of St. Gabriel Church, whose valuable services on the Board will always be gratefully remembered. Does the memory of the unselfish lives that have gone from among us teach us nothing? Is the benefit of their example to be lost to the church?

May their successors bear in mind that 1892,-the year now reported upon,-marks the Centenary of the building of the historic Church on the Champ de Mars, where they so lately worshipped, and that in the enlarged field of labour to which they have been called, they will worthily carry on the work and maintain the reputation of old St. Gabriel's.
