Anything relating to the early customs, either of the first European settlers or the Indians, will be welcome, as also pictures of the town or its early buildings or people; any books belonging to the library formed in 1800, weapons, flags, military dress, wampum; a mealing stone is particularly desired. Articles may be either given or loaned for a time, and thus much pleasure and profit gained by the visitors.
