Fredericton, May 20.—The annual meeting of the New Brunswick Telephone Company was held here today.

President S. H. White in the chair. It was decided to vote \$500 to the Belgian relief fund and \$500 towards the field kitchens for the 26th Battalion.

President White in his annual report said in part:

"Your board during last year subscribed \$1,000 to the Canadian patriotic fund, and also guaranteed to four of its employees, who have enlisted for foreign service, that upon their return their positions would be open for them. This section we feel will meet with your unqualified approval."

"While we all firmly believe that the cause of right will eventually triumph, and we who stay at home must be prepared not only to do all in our power for those fighting the battles of the empire, but we must expect sorrows and depression along certain trade channels. This will naturally affect public corporations such as telephone companies, and in view of this fact, it is not surprising that the normal increase in users of which has not been maintained."

The increase last year was 1,171 phones, as against 1,004 and 1,024 in each of two years preceding. We believe, however, that trade depression has been less evident in New Brunswick than in any other province in the dominion.

Hardy Nason and his brother-in-law, James Nostle, while removing a stump on Nason's farm near Fredericton Junction, recently uncovered two moulded ingots of yellowish metal which they believe to be gold. Samples have been sent to Montreal for analysis. The weight of the metal is about a hundred pounds, and if it is gold, would be worth about \$27,000.

W.C.T.U. DISAPPOINTED WITH THE GOVERNMENT ACTION RE LIQUOR

"We ask bread; we are given a stone"

—was an expression used in a resolution passed at the quarterly meeting of the St. John County W. C. T. U. yesterday afternoon with reference to the recent "short-lived" liquor legislation. The union sincerely regretted that the measure fell so far and so seriously short of their plea for total prohibition and drafted the resolution, a copy of which is to be sent to the government.

The business otherwise was largely routine. Mrs. J. McAvity occupied the chair and encouraging reports were received from the various districts of the union. Mrs. Joseph Seymour reported that 11,000 sailors visited the mission during the winter and she had spoken on her work among the sailors.

Mrs. Finnis, a pioneer member was welcomed. She began her work with the organization when she was 14 years of age and has been faithful to it for more than fifty years. Mrs. Hipwell gave a short address on matters pertinent to the time and following there was a discussion on scientific instruction in schools and also on the recent legislation of the government regarding the liquor business.

Mrs. Crowell then moved the resolution expressing dissatisfaction with the government's legislation and Mrs. Hipwell seconded it.

Rev. Mr. Hayward spoke on organization, "new methods and old," and said that no matter what legislation were adopted as long as the appetite for intoxicants remained there would be work for the W. C. T. U. Mrs. Crowell gave a reading and there was a solo by Miss Stevens, accompanied by Miss M. Stevens.

The meeting was held in the Methodist church, Fairville.

REDMOND NOT TO TAKE PLACE IN GOVERNMENT

London, May 20, 920 p. m.—The National government which is to guide the British empire for the duration of the war is now in progress of formation. The leaders of the political parties were in conference throughout the day, arranging details.

No statement has yet been made as to the personnel of the new ministry except that Premier Asquith and Foreign Secretary Grey will remain in the posts which they now hold. Thus far, all the statements as to the allotment of offices have been based largely on surmise.

It appears certain, however, that there will be a new civil head of the Admiralty and war office, respectively, and possibly in the professional heads as well, on at any rate, a re-adjustment of the responsibility.

Earl Kitchener, the secretary for war, it is generally agreed, has too much to do in the direction of the war, raising new armies and the organization of the output of munitions, and some of these duties will be shifted to other ministers.

Chancellor Lloyd George and A. Bonar Law, leader of the opposition, are about equally favored for civil head of the war office, and A. J. Balfour is mentioned for a similar position in the Admiralty. In
