## CARRIGAN IS NAMED AS RED SOX PILOT

Former Successful Leader Returns to Manage Boston Team

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 30.—William E. "Bill" Carrigan, of Lewiston, Maine, manager of the Boston Red Sox in the heyday of the championship years before the world war, today was again named manager of his old club on a two-year contract, to succeed Lee Fohl, resigned.

President Bob Quinn made the announcement after a five minutes' conference with Carrigan at Fenway Park today, and although no salary was mentioned it was understood that the figure named was the highest ever offered a Boston manager.

Carrigan reached the height of his first stay in fast company in 1915 and 1916, when he piloted the Sox to successive world's championships over the Phillies and the Brooklyn Dodgers. It was during this period that he developed and handled such stars as Ruth, Carl Mays, Dutch Leonard, Joe Wood, Ray Collins, Everett Scott, and the famous combine of Lewis, Speaker and Hooper, often dubbed the greatest outfielders organized baseball ever saw. Although he is returning to the big league at the age of 43 he was called "The Original Boy Manager" when he succeeded Jake Stahl as pilot of the Red Sox in 1913.

## Outfielder's Job As Big League Manager Tough One

DETROIT, Dec. 1.—Ty Cobb is convinced that an outfielder works under a serious handicap as a major league manager. He so expressed himself recently after resigning as pilot of the Tigers.

"In the first place, an outfield manager, because of his isolated position, finds it difficult to keep in touch with the system of play," says Ty.

"A manager who plays the infield or catches is right on the job, constantly familiar with what is happening. This position makes it easier for him to offer advice or suddenly decide on a shift in the playing end of the game. Likewise he is in a position to get a line on his pitching."

Also, quite important, is the fact that major league umpires are far less indulgent with outfield managers than those in the infield or on the bench. When a manager, from his position in the outfield, starts to come into the infield to make a change or offer a suggestion, the umpires at once threaten him with ejection from the game for purposely delaying it.

"While some of these things may seem of minor importance, all summed together, they amount to quite a managerial handicap."

## RANGERS GAIN FIRST PLACE IN U. S. DIVISION

Ottawa Retains Lead In Canadian Section; Results Last Night

MONTREAL, Dec. 1.—Ottawa retained its lead in the Canadian division while the New York Rangers emerged on top of the United States division as results of four games played in the National Hockey League last night. The surprise of the night was the six to nothing blanking given to Pittsburgh by the lowly St. Patricks, at Toronto. Not much less of a surprise was the sound 4-0 drubbing administered to the World champion Maroons at Montreal by the team from whom they captured that title, the Detroit Cougars, formerly the Victoria Cougars in the Western Hockey League. Ottawa beat Boston in that city, by 2 to 1, while the Rangers took an overtime battle from the Chicago Blackhaws at Madison Square Garden, 4 to 3.

While not in the game as far as the score was concerned, Pittsburgh put up a dashy fight, and it was all that the Detroit Cougars could do to keep the score board clean. McCurry, Pittsburgh, and Day, St. Patricks, received major penalties for exchanging blows just at the finish of the game. Playing a smooth invincible defence and better combination on the line, Detroit held Montreal in check brilliantly. They not only managed to hold on to a two goal lead established in the first two periods, but when Montreal through over anxiety, gave up a goal in the third period, they doubled that score.

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## GOOD PRICES PAID AT OLD GLORY SALE

Mizzi, Bay Filly, Brings \$9,000 and Fireglove, \$6,500—Other Prices

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—The most successful harness horse sales, the 32nd annual Old Glory Auction, was in full swing today at the Squadron Armories. One hundred and forty harness horses changed hands yesterday, one consignment of 39 from the Wand Hall Farm stables, at Doneraile, Kentucky, bringing a total of \$81,838. Another lot from the same consignor will be put up later in the sale.

The top price yesterday was \$9,000—paid by the Kingston Farm, of Lexington, for Mizzi, a bay filly by Guy Asworthy out of Bronze Silk. The same purchaser took Fireglove, a chestnut son of San Francisco and Worthy out of the Wand Hall Farm stables. The same farm received \$5,200 from the Guy Asworthy of Cita Frisco, Sanford Small, of Atlantic, Mass., bought Andy 2 the Great, a colt of McGregor, out of the Wand Hall Farm stables, for \$4,000. Several other Wand Hall horses brought \$2,500 or over. The average for the 39 head was \$1,329.

**Hockey Leagues Agree On Marking of Ice**

TORONTO, Nov. 30.—President Frank Calder, acting for the National Hockey League, and other professional organizations, and W. A. Hewitt, chairman of the Rules Committee, acting for the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, have agreed on a uniform marking of the ice in all hockey rings under the jurisdiction of these two organizations marked the same for both amateur and professional hockey games.
