INTER-ASSOCIATION BOWLERS BREAK THREE RECORDS THIS YEAR

THURSTON HAS NEW INDIVIDUAL AVERAGE OF 98

Single String and Three String Marks Also Are Exceeded

The Inter-Association bowling league averages for the entire season have been given out by T. D. Owens, secretary of the league, and these show that several new records for the league were set this year. The records broken include the high season average which was made by Thurston with 98.24. The new single string record established was 141 while the exceptional high mark of 882 was rolled for a new three string total. The team single string of 837 and team total of 1,646 made last season by the Y. M. H. A. were not broken this year.

The Knights of Pythias were the league winners while second place for the year was captured by the Garrison team. The K. of P. now have one win and the G. W. V. A. two wins on the handsomely cup donated by Hon. R. W. Wignom, honorary president of the league. The cup along with other prizes were presented to the winners at the annual league banquet held last evening.

The competition was very keen throughout the season and it was only during the last few games that the Knights of Pythias clinched premier honors. The winners and Garrison team tied in total pinfall for both series.

WELTER TITLE HOLDER ANXIOUS TO BOX FLOWERS

Rickard Completes Negotiations For Bout Between Two Champions

NEW YORK, April 16.—Aspirations of Mickey Walker to become a double ring champion were revived yesterday with the completion of negotiations by Tex Rickard for the welterweight title holder to fight Tiger Flowers, Georgia negro, in a fifteen round bout for the middleweight crown at the Yankee Stadium in June. Approval of the match, which will mark Flowers' first defence of the middleweight championship, he lifted from Harry Greb less than two months ago, will be sought of the State Athletic Commission today.

At the same time, Rickard will renew his attempt to obtain official aid in signing Jack Delaney to box Paul Berlenbach for light heavyweight honors on June 15.
