

ADDRESS AND PURSE GIVEN DR. FREEMAN

Retiring Charlotte Street Baptist Church Pastor Honored by Congregation

MRS. FREEMAN IS ALSO REMEMBERED

Recipient of Leather Hat Box by Sunday School Class

A purse of \$100 in gold and an address of warm appreciation were presented to Rev. Dr. C. R. Freeman, pastor of the Charlotte street Baptist church, at the close of the evening service in the church last night, when Dr. Freeman had preached the final sermon of a pastorate of four and a half years, and had spoken feelingly of his pleasant associations in the church and his regret in parting.

The presentation was made by D. C. Clark and Dr. Freeman replied suitably. Dr. and Mrs. Freeman and Miss Carver will be the guests of Mrs. A. E. Hartt and Miss Jessie Hartt from Wednesday of this week until Friday, when they are leaving to spend a vacation in Laurencetown, N. S. Dr. Freeman's ultimate plans are definitely made, but it is probable that he will later go to the United States. Rev. James Dunlop is to be the new pastor of the church, and will enter on his duties in September.

The full choir of the church was present last night and rendered excellent music. Mrs. Freeman sang the solo "Hold Thou My Hand" very effectively. She has been a very valued member of the choir throughout her stay in West Saint John. A few days ago the choir members presented a silver basket filled with roses to Mrs. Freeman as a token of appreciation and a farewell gift. Yesterday afternoon the members of the Ever Ready Sunday school class made the presentation of a very handsome leather hatbox to Mrs. Freeman, who has been the beloved teacher of the class. The presentation was made by Mrs. William Bejaya in a pleasing address, and Mrs. Freeman made a suitable reply.

THE ADDRESS
The address to Rev. Dr. Freeman follows:
Rev. C. R. Freeman, M.A., D.D., pastor of Charlotte street Baptist church, Saint John West, N. B., Canada.

Our Very Dear Brother—It is with feelings of sadness we have gathered here to say farewell to our spiritual father, who has been a blessing to us for the past four and one half years.

Before you came to us we knew of your high record as a Christian pastor and your outstanding service to the cause of Christ, a service which has been recognized by Acadia University in conferring on you the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

During your pastorate among us you have exemplified the highest ideals of the Christian ministry and the church. Your churches have been blessed with a more sincere and hard working pastor.

As a preacher you have given us the old time gospel of Jesus Christ with an earnestness and fervor seldom seen in these modern days. You have organized the young people into Junior and senior B. Y. P. U., taught in the Sunday school brotherhood, and attended to all the other demands incident to a pastor's life.

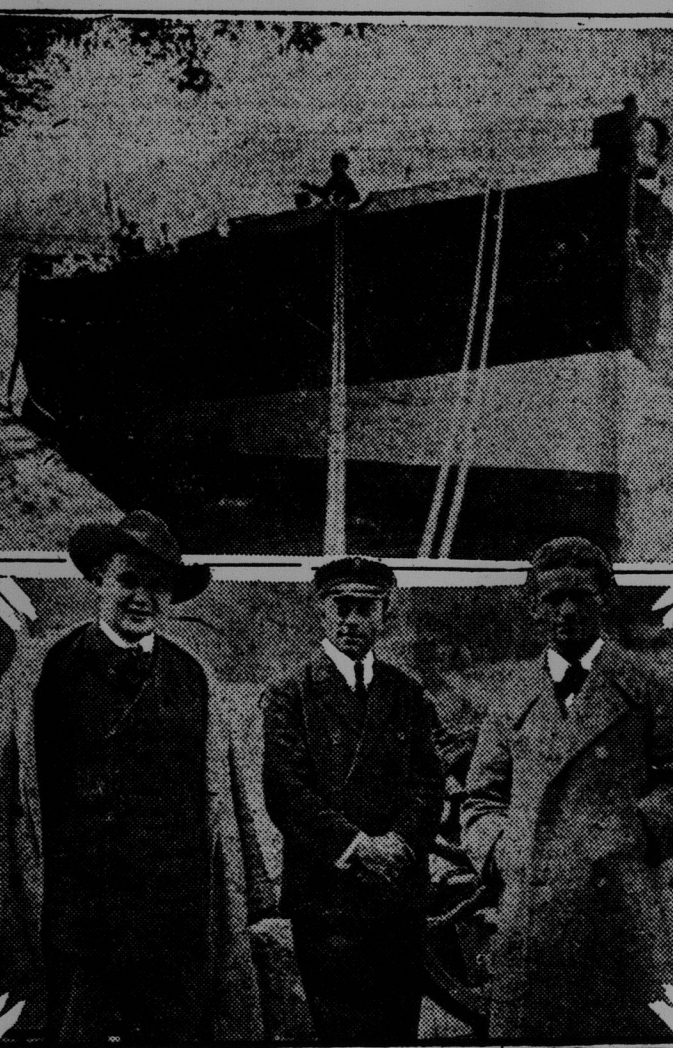

The late Mr. Dolg was very prominent in Oddfellows' work and was a trustee of Oliver Lodge. He was also an elder of Knox Presbyterian church of which he has been a member for 33 years.

MUST MAKE GOOD LOSSES OF BANK

Shareholders of Wrecked Institution at Warren, Mass., Held Liable

BOSTON, June 26.—Three well known residents of Worcester, Edward W. Cowe, William J. Thayer and Edward B. Fletcher and the estate of the late Raymond B. Fletcher, all former stockholders of the Warren National Bank of Warren—wrecked by its president, Joseph B. Marcine, who is now serving a long sentence at Atlanta—must pay large sums as additional assessments on the capital stock to make good part of the \$200,000 loss to the bank, according to the decision of Federal Judge Brewster.

Suit was brought against the respondents by James E. Farrell, receiver of the bank, and the court orders Cowe to pay \$10,000; Edward B. Fletcher \$2,000; and William J. Thayer \$10,000. The estate of the late Commissioner Fletcher is assessed \$2,700.
