COLUMBUS HONORED BY ARGENTINA

A majestic statue of Christopher Columbus the gift of the Italian colony in Buenos Ayres to Argentina, was dedicated last week. President Yrigoyen had decreed the day a legal holiday. The statue, with its base and pillar, is about eighty-five feet in height and stands in the plaza in front of the government house overlooking the broad River Plate. It is plainly visible from ships entering the harbor. The statue is the work of the Italian sculptor, Arnaldo Zocchi, and the figure of the great discoverer was carved out of a single block of marble nearly twenty feet high, weighing forty tons. There was a parade of Italian societies in honor of the event.

CHEAPER COAL DURING SUMMER

Possibility if United States Congress Passes Frelinghuysen Bill.

Washington, June 23—Cheaper coal this summer will become a possibility if Congress passes without delay the Frelinghuysen bill providing for seasonal freight rates for coal.

The bill authorizes the Interstate Commerce Commission to establish rates, varying as to season, provided that the average annual yield to the carriers is not diminished. Under such authority it is planned to fix rates lower in summer than during the remainder of the year, with a view to promote summer buying and storing of coal, and steadier mine operation.

President Harding is convinced that a lowering of freight rates would reduce the price of coal materially but railroad executives dispute the soundness of this view, contending that the transportation cost is now only 2-1/2 per cent. of the price to the consumer. The coal interests favor the seasonal rate bill and the railroads have offered no opposition to date. Its early passage by the Senate is predicted, and the house will be urged to pass it as an emergency measure.

A companion bill for stabilization of the coal industry will be called up by Senator Frelinghuysen as soon as the other measure is disposed of.

HOME AND SCHOOL AIMS ARE DEFINED

(Toronto Globe)

While Home and School Clubs are being established all over the country, and the work is strengthening steadily, there still exists on the part of many inexperienced educators as to what this home and school movement really stands for in order to make clear its aims the following explanation is given:

"The great principle of the Home and School Club movement is that of preventing human ills by studying child nature and human nature, and of giving to all boys and girls the type of education that is best suited to their natural abilities and to their country's needs. It seeks to prevent their becoming units and misfits.

"The Home and School Clubs are endeavoring to create higher standards of parenthood and to improve the conditions of school life, because these are the fundamental forces for building health and character.

"Home and School Clubs are drawing into closer co-operation the parents and teachers and educators, so that they may better understand one another's methods and purposes of dealing with the child life of every community. The Home and School movement is applicable to every rural and urban district, with the school house as the community centre for debates and conferences for social, intellectual and recreational purposes.

"The education of the child—his body, mind and soul—demands the intelligent co-operation of parents, teachers, preachers and legislators—all men and women interested in developing leadership, in education and in an education suited to individual and national health and character.

"The Home and School movement seeks the co-operation of other organizations working for child and adult education, with the object of strengthening individual and national health and character."

HERE'S A ROAST FOR COAL PRODUCERS

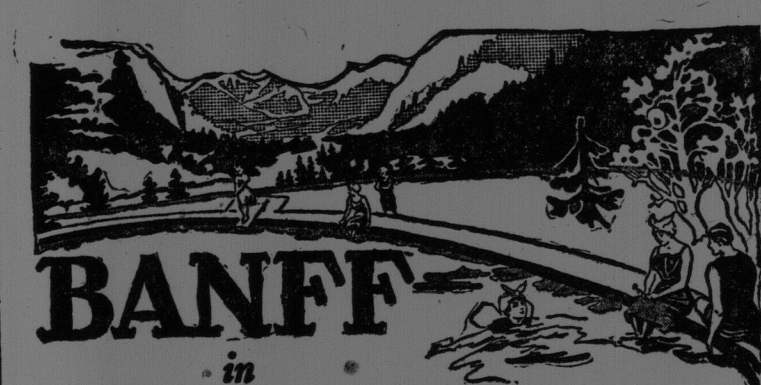
