Grand Falls, Oct. 25—Mrs. Ella Plagg Young of Chicago, chairman of the National Women's Liberty Loan committee, died here today of pneumonia, following a short illness from influenza.

Grand Falls, Oct. 25—The death of Miss Estelle Paradis took place at her home here on Friday morning. She was about twenty years of age and had been in poor health for some years. A short time ago she took influenza and lived only a few days. She was a daughter of Denis Paradis.

Grand Falls, Oct. 25—William Cyr, a well-known business man of St. Andre, Madawaska county, died on Wednesday after a brief illness. His brother, John Cyr, died only a few days before. John Dubay, another well-known resident of St. Andre, died on the same day.

Grand Falls, Oct. 25—Mrs. Richard McCarthy of Rapid des Francais, died on Friday of influenza. She leaves a husband and family.

Grand Falls, Oct. 25—Walter McLaughlin, of Ortonville, died on Friday after a brief illness. He was a son of the late Charles McLaughlin and was highly respected by all who knew him. He leaves a widowed mother, two brothers and three sisters.

Hartland, Oct. 25—Miss Alveretta Estabrooks received the sad news of the death of her nephew, Kenneth Estabrooks, aged eighteen years, son of Arthur Estabrooks, of Vancouver (B. C.), death being due to pneumonia.

Hartland, Oct. 24—The death occurred at Windsor of Miss Zella Henderson, daughter of Armond Henderson, death being due to pneumonia following influenza. Three other members of the family are very ill of the same disease.

Newcastle, Oct. 25—The death of Ray, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Chambers, of Halcott, occurred last night. He had been ill for a year and at last succumbed to Spanish influenza.

Newcastle, Oct. 25—The death of Mrs. Myrtle Kirkpatrick, wife of Leslie Kirkpatrick, of Douglastown, occurred on Friday afternoon.

Newcastle, Oct. 25—The death of Miss Mary Ann Lawlor, one of the oldest and most respected residents of Newcastle, occurred yesterday afternoon of pneumonia. She was seventy years of age.

Miss Christina Colwell of Fredericton died yesterday afternoon of pneumonia. She was twenty-three years old. Besides her father she leaves one sister.

Newcastle, Oct. 25—The death of Mrs. Harold Williston, of Bay du Vin, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph L.

St. John on Saturday received a wire notifying him of the death of his seven-year-old son.

Grand Falls, Oct. 25—The news of the death of Mrs. Patrick A. McCluskey on Friday afternoon was a great shock to everyone. She had been ill only four days with pneumonia. Mrs. McCluskey was, before her marriage, Miss Minnie James Barnett, a well known clerk in the C. G. R. general freight agent's office in Moncton, died on Saturday of pneumonia following an attack of influenza. He was thirty-four years old and leaves a wife and infant son.

Newcastle, Oct. 25—After about two weeks' illness of influenza and pneumonia, during the last few days of which she seemed to be improving, Mrs. Percy Russell died at 3 o'clock this morning.
