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FOOD IS CHEAP IN ALL ENGLISH CITIES

Government Regulation Put a Stop to Any Unseemly Advances

London (by mail)—Food is cheap in Great Britain and in some cases prices are actually below those ruling before war was declared. The government is regulating the price of all essential staples and every few days a list is published showing the maximum price which a retailer may charge.

Sugar is perhaps the most expensive commodity at this time, the price fixed being approximately one cent a pound against 6 cents before the war began. Fish is somewhat more expensive, too, on account of the restrictions in the North Sea where disasters to shipping due to mines has unnerved fishermen.

Fruit is rotting in the markets. In the first place England enjoyed a bumper fruit crop, and owing to the high price of sugar housewives are unable to preserve their usual complement. A few pennies will buy a basket of first-class fruit in London.

Meat is little above normal quotations. Cereals are practically unchanged in price compared with those obtaining before the war commenced.

Should a retail store charge prices above those allowed by the government figures, the stores are seized by the officials.

Dairy products are cheap and have not advanced in price. Nearly every day a boat load of eggs, butter and cheese arrives from Denmark.

METHODIST CONFERENCE

Ottawa, Sept. 23—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, N. W. Rowell, K. C., leader of the opposition in the Ontario legislature, Hon. Martin Burrell, minister of agriculture, and Mr. McCreary of Ottawa, joined tonight in welcoming to the capital the 250 delegates to the general conference of the Methodist church in Canada, which opened its sessions this morning.

In extending a welcome to the delegates, Sir Wilfrid referred to the war, and its causes.

"It is a matter of pride to know that we are not the aggressor in the present conflict," he said. "It is a matter of pride that, although we detect war, we are proud to be in this war because we are fighting for the cause of justice and truth. Records show that when the British empire was at war it was because peace could not be kept with honor."

"Our duty in Canada is to help the Mother Country with the last dollar and the last man if it need be," Sir Wilfrid said, amid applause. "The sword must not be put back again until the German bully is taught that what he terms a 'nerve display of paper' is something more than that. The sword must be put back into the scabbard until the dignity of religion has been restored to its former position."

Rev. Dr. Chown, one of the conference superintendents, said that the Methodist church is willing to resume negotiations with the Presbyterians regarding church union. He gave an interesting outline of principles of union.

Nearly \$1,000,000 was raised in the four years for Sunday school purposes, the actual amount being \$961,074; for missionary work, \$209,886; for all purposes, \$1,469,428.

The work of preparing a new hymn book which has taken up about four years has been completed.

TRIAL ENDED BY DEATH

John J. Dallas, charged With Embellishment of \$50,000, Killed by Train While on Way to Court

Philadelphia, Sept. 24.—The trial of John J. Dallas, bookkeeper, charged with embellishing \$50,000 from a wholesale jewelry firm, came to a sudden end when Dallas was killed by an elevated train while on his way to court.

Dallas had been on trial for several days and his wife and sister were with him when he was killed.

Dallas, on a salary of \$20 a week, owned a handsome home in Ardmore, a suburb, entertained extensively and drove a automobile, and in addition had money in several banks. To account for his prosperity he said he did expert work for outside firms, receiving liberal fees, but witnesses denied this.

ILL WITH APPENDICITIS

Lillian Russell, Actress, is Successfully Operated on

Pittsburg, Sept. 24.—Stricken with appendicitis, Lillian Russell, actress, and wife of Alexander P. Moore, publisher of the Pittsburg Leader, was operated on at the West Penn Hospital. Immediately following the operation it was said by the hospital authorities that Miss Russell was doing as well as could be expected.

The patient was taken from a hotel to the hospital. She had lately returned to this city from her summer home in Atlantic City, where she was stricken with a serious illness a few months ago while in bathing.
