### FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

> Lesson No. 200. POINTS TO REMEMBER.

Vernier adjustments are very useful aids on regenerative receivers owing to the extreme sharpness of tuning. A slight movement of tuning knob may occasion the complete loss of a signal which previously had a nigh degree of audibility. This sharpness of tuning due to "balancing out" the resistance of the circuit of regeneration, the resistance beting reducible to as small a value as a few hundredths of an ohm.

When signals from a distant transmitting station are too weak to operate the detector, these minute amounts of energy may be built up through the use of radio-frequency amplification, until they are strong enough to cause the detector to properly perform its function.

A tuning chart is a valuable means of tuning rapidly and easily to the signals from a desired transmitting station. For example, in a receiving circuit containing a vario-copuler and two variometers a chart containing eight vertical columns will give the proper setting of the variometer and vario-coupler dials and the position of the switches controlling the promary taps. The columns should be headed as follows: (1) names of station, (2) call letters, (3) wave length, (4) grid variometer, (5) vario-coupler, (6) plate variometer, (7) Taps right, (8) Taps left. Settings for a particular station, previously determined and recorded on the chart provide a ready reference for tuning to a desired station.

The improvement in signal strength often noted when either the antenna or ground terminals are touched with the finger, is due to what is so commonly known as "body capacity." The body acts as a condenser of low capacity and touching the connections is equivalent to inserting a condenser in circuit.

When it is desired to amplify the incoming radio signals without producing a rectifying action, the voltage of the grid should be adjusted to a point on the straight line portion of the grid voltage-plate current curve. Under this condition, when a small change in either direction is made in the grid voltage, the increase in plate current corresponding to a change in grid voltage in one direction will be equal to the decrease in plate current resulting from an equal change in grid voltage in the opposite direction. The wave form of the plate current will therefore reproduce the wave-form of the grid voltage variation.

The electrolyte in storage batteries should not be allowed to fall below the level of the plates, distilled water being added at sufficient intervals to maintain a level at least one-half inch above the plates and not high enough to allow the solution to spill over and cause a short-circuit on the top of the battery. If the level of the electrolyte is allowed to remain below the top of the plates they will become suplated which increases the internal resistance and lowers the capacity of the battery.

A one-tenth (0.1) Henry choke coil for use in the filtering system of the Armstrong Super-regenerative circuit may be constructed by winding approximately 680 turns of No. 26 magnet wire on one leg of a close laminated iron core. The dimensions of the closed core should be approximately one-half inch by one-half inch and two inches square. The loop antenna for use with this circuit may consist of twelve turns of the No. 18 bell wire spaced one and one-half inches apart on a frame four feet square.
