MR. HEAP:

- Q. How do you know that Peter George was your father hired man?
- A. I have seen him for years with my father in our place, before we went there and he went with us down there.
- Q. He worked with your father as hired man up in St. Andrews before you went down? A. Yes.
- Q. And he went down there with you? A. Yes, and he has married there.
- Q. When you were down there wintering did he work for your father then? A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What kind of work did he do? A. Hauling hay or chopping wood or something like that.
- Q. During these winteres that you have spoken of did this man, Peter George, work for anyone else besides your father?
- A. Oh, I could not really say. There was not many to work for down there at that time.
- Q. Was he working for your father throughout the whole of each of these winters?
- A. Some years he would work all winter.
- Q. Did you ever hear him speak of the lot, as to who owned the lot, did you ever hear Peter George say whose lot it was?
- A. Not till after the Treaty, he claimed it them.
- Q. Did you ever hear your father in his presence speak of whose lot it was?
- A. No. never.
- Q. Did Peter George ever tell you how he got the lot, claimed to get it.
- A. No, he did not.
- Q. He did not say that he had bought it from your father?
- A. No.
- Q. Is that all you know about that?
- A. Yes.
