SASKATCHEWAN INDUSTRIES' STEADY GROWTH.

Industry is making steady growth in Saskatchewan, according to fig-ures published as a result of a sur-yey made by the Bureau of Industry n and Labor of the Provincial Depart-ment of Agriculture. During the facal year ending Auril 80, 1880, the tear number of Insteries in Bur-hatchewan was 105, employing 3.177 persons and using 14.800 h. Ac-cidents reported during the year were 813, of which 18 were fatal.


