Predicts Return of Laurier Government in Comina Election.

Vancouver, July 31.—In an able speech in which he reviewed his past six years' services, R. G. Macpherson ecorators' Association of Canada was last night announced his retirement from the local field of politics. W. W. B. McInnes and Robert Jardine, Liberal nominee for New Westminster, joined with the retiring member in predicting the return of the Laurier gov ernment in Vancouver and throughout British Columbia.

"Electors of this constituency are too sensible to sit in the cold shades of opposition and obstruction for the next four years," said Mr. Macpher
