THE BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL And the winter mail service-Yesterday's


The Council of the Board of Trade met yesterday, when a resolution from the Quebec Board of Trade recommending that a subsidy be, if necessary, towards a proposed line of ateamers to ply between the St. Lawrence and Maritime Province norts via the Panama Canal to British Columbia ports, was read, and a similar resolution supporting the proposal was passed unanimously by the Council.

A resolution from the Montreal Board of Trade complaining about the poor mail service, and stating that owing to the withdrawal of some of the faster boats, this service is at the present time unsatiafactory, and that the government should avail itself of the service provided by the fast steamers from New York.

In bringing the resolution to the attention of the Council, the secretary reviewed the information which he has been collecting regarding the operation of the mail boats under the existing contract with the Dominion Government. Acting on instructions of the Council, he has collected full information regarding the sailings, arrivals, time consumed in despatching and receiving mails time.

The secretary in his report of the meeting status continued and consistent work
