### ST. JOHN IS THE ONLY PORT IN CANADA PLANNING FOR A DRY DOCK

Edward Bath, of Norton Griffiths Company, in City Yesterday, Thinks There is No Possibility of Dock and Ship Repair Plant Going to Any Other Atlantic Port.

That the new government at Ottawa will do all in its power to facilitate the working out of the project of establishing a dry dock at Courtenay Bay, is the opinion of Edward Bath, M.A., B.Sc., consulting engineer for the Campbell Laird Shipbuilding Company, and the Norton Griffiths Co. He believes that when Parliament assembles the present dry dock subsidy act, which provides for the construction of a dry dock 900 feet in length, with an entrance 90 feet in breadth and a depth on the sill of feet, will be amended to provide for the construction of a dock between 1,100 and 1,300 feet in length with an entrance of 110 feet and a depth of at least 40 feet. A larger dock, he thinks has been made necessary by recent developments which point to the possibility of a great increase in the size of the ships trading between Canada and the Mother Country.

Mr. Bath arrived in the city yesterday for the purpose of consulting with the minister of marine. When seen at the Royal by a Standard reporter he said he had no authority to say anything in reference to the proposed harbor works at Courtenay Bay, as there was a matter under the jurisdiction of the Dominion engineers acting on instructions from the government, but as consulting engineer for the proposed dry dock and shipbuilding plant with which he has been identified since its inception, he made the following statement:

"My present visit to St. John has special and particular reference to the dry dock and I shall take up the consideration of certain details which must be worked out. I don't think the change of government at all affects the position of the project. An official dry dock is an outstanding and admitted need of the Atlantic coast of Canada, and it is also recognized that a shipbuilding plant should be located at the same place to maintain and retain a class of workmen able to do all kinds of work connected with ship repairing.

**Must Have Larger Dock.**  
"In my opinion it would be an absolute waste of money to construct a dry dock at this or any other spot of the limited dimensions stipulated by the Dry Dock Subsidy Act of 1910. That act when it was framed was intended to cover all the requirements of modern shipbuilding, but during the short period which has elapsed the tonnage of ocean going steamships has increased by leaps and bounds, and orders are about to be placed for express steamers for the Canadian mail service of a size which could not be accommodated by the stipulations of the act of 1910.

**APPLE EXHIBITS TO BE SHOWN ELSEWHERE**

**New Brunswick Fruit to Have Prominent Place in Exhibitions in Other Provinces—Mr. Turney's Plans.**

Yesterday many of the exhibits at the Fruit show were sold and drawn, and the department of agriculture made arrangements for placing some of the exhibits on display at the shows in Toronto and Ottawa. J. N. Robertson, of Smith and Robertson, Havana, who was an interested visitor to the show, purchased boxes of apples which he intends to try out on the Cuban market. His purchase consists of four varieties—Bethel, Baxter, Fameuse, and McIntosh Red—which he thinks should command good prices in the Cuban capital.

On Monday the department of agriculture will ship 50 boxes of apples to Toronto where they will be exhibited by the province in the Horticultural exhibition there next week. Twenty boxes will be sent to Ottawa for the conference of Dominion fruit growers, which takes place about Dec. 12th. This will be the first conference of its kind since 1906. Twelve boxes will be sent to McDonald College. Fifty barrels of assorted varieties, four or five in each barrel, will be shipped to England and distributed among the population centres. The balance of the government exhibit will likely be sold by auction in the rink on Monday afternoon.

Many of the private exhibitors are preparing their apples to be shipped to Amherst for the Winter Fair, to be held there about Dec. 5th, while the rest will be sold at private sale in the rink on Friday afternoon. A. G. Turney, Provincial Horticulturist, to whom the success of this show may be largely attributed, being chiefly responsible for the carrying out of the government's progressive policy which has produced such good results, will leave next week for Toronto to attend the horticultural exhibition there.

As an indication of the interest which is being shown in the development of the fruit raising industry in New Brunswick, it may be mentioned that Mr. Turney has been invited to deliver lectures on fruit raising in New Brunswick, at the convention of Fruit growers in Toronto, and at the meeting of the Pomological Society in Quebec on December 5th.
