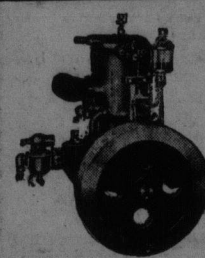

## NO INTERFERENCE IF GOODS PURCHASED BEFORE MARCH 1ST

Assurance to the effect given by British Embassy—Importers must show proofs, however.

Washington, April 9.—American merchants and importers have been invited by the State Department, in a circular letter made public tonight, to send in for submission to the British embassy, proofs that goods purchased in Germany and now in transit, or awaiting shipment, were paid for before March 1. Assurances have been given by the British embassy that in production of such proof goods will not be interfered with by the Allied warships.

Robert F. Rose and William B. Fleming, foreign trade advisers of the department, are handling this business. They are acting unofficially, since they cannot commit the government to any recognition of the legality of the British blockade order-in-council, but their informal co-operation has been accepted by the embassy officials.

It is understood that vast quantities of merchandise, including the dyestuffs, for lack of which American textile factories are on the verge of shutting down, will be released for shipment as soon as the proofs of their purchases before March 1, are submitted.

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ty for which it received no return. Last year he had asked the government to increase judges' salary to \$250 and registrar's \$150, but he noticed that they had only been increased to \$150 and \$100, figures which he thought were not high enough for such a progressive county as Victoria.

Probate business was growing in the county, in fact everything else was growing, with the possible exception of the Liberal party, and in matters of these salaries he thought the government should have been more liberal.

Hon. Mr. Clarke said he sympathized for honorable member for Victoria in his desire to get as much as possible for his county officials. No doubt they were capable men, and perhaps the salaries were somewhat small, but both of the officials were able to carry on their regular business and for a short time which their duties as probate officials occupied them, their salaries were a sort of "found" money.

He was prepared to admit that the returns for two of the years referred to had been pretty substantial but they were away above the average. For instance, in 1910 stamps sold amounted to \$214, in 1911 to \$144, and last year (1914), to \$206.

In readjustment of salaries, which was made some three or four months ago, all matters connected with it were very carefully considered, and he might say the only county in which any increase in salary was given was Victoria. Salaries now being paid, it would be noticed, were in excess of returns for the years 1910, 1911 and 1914, so that for three years returns would not have been sufficient to pay the salaries now being paid. The two years in which larger amounts were received were extraordinary, and were not likely to be repeated before the will of the honorable member for Victoria came to be proved, which he hoped would not be a very long time yet.

Mr. Carter said he did not wish it to be thought he did not appreciate the concession made to his county officials, but at the same time even if the average stamps duty receipts were less than salaries now fixed, the government still had over \$1,600 to fall back on. Under the present scale the probate makes more than the judge, and the present judge would be \$100 a year better off if he had never taken the job.

Mr. Perley inquired if Sunbury county was a paying institution from the point of view of probate receipts and payments.

Hon. Mr. Clarke in reply, said that the returns for Sunbury county in 1913 were \$575; 1911, \$78, and 1910, \$232, or an average of about \$295 a year, out of which they paid salaries amounting to \$195, which left a little profit for the government.

Mr. Perley replied that he had hoped that there was one department at least in which Sunbury made something to the good.

Armstrong for great trouble he had gone to in preparing this bill. It was very gratifying indeed to find officials taking such warm interest in matters relating to their offices as to be willing to travel so far outside the scope of their duties in order to raise the standard of proceedings. The Probate Court of St. John was administered with every care for the protection of estates. His experience had been that if there were any claims which needed sifting it was in regard to claims against estates. Men would not go to the debtor himself, but when he died they had no scruples about making a raid on his estate. Under Judge Armstrong's supervision St. John probate court was conducted in the highest possible way, in strong contrast to what he had seen in that court on previous occasions when things had happened which he would rather not make mention of.

Hon. Mr. Wilson agreed, and said that instances had occurred where Judge Armstrong had been the means of saving serious losses to small estates. He heartily endorsed every word the Attorney General had said.

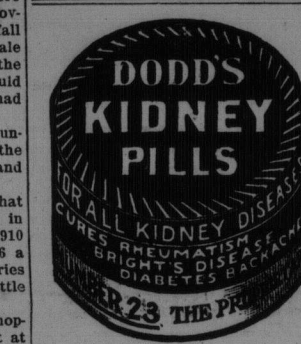

He (Clarke) did not think he could add anything to strengthen the expression of appreciation of Judge Armstrong's efforts to what had already been said.

The bill was then agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Clarke in moving that the House adjourn until 8.30 on Monday evening, expressed the hope that members would come prepared to stay over next Saturday in order to expedite the business of the session.

House adjourned at 6.20 o'clock.

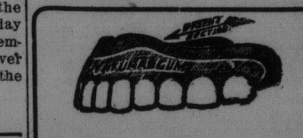
