## THE TWO JOHNSTONS.

Alkie as two peas doesn't go for the two members of the Johnston family now doing the brother act in the National League. Wheeler, who first batted for Pittsburgh, is inclined to the tall and slender variety, while James, who plays the outfield for Brooklyn, mostly against left-handed pitchers, belongs to the short and shunky class. Moreover, Wheeler is very much of a left-hander, while James is strictly in the right-handed class.

These things they do claim in common: Loyalty to Tennessee as the best state to hail from and the National League as the proper circuit to shine in, for both in the American got what they say was not exactly a fair deal—that is, they didn't exactly make good. Wheeler was with Cleveland and James was with the White Sox. Doc is the older by more than two years, but they blossomed out in baseball as professionals the same year, Wheeler with Chattanooga and James with Wewahatche. This was in 1908. Wheeler's advance was more rapid and his first break into the majors was in 1909, with Cincinnati. James was a couple of years later getting his chance. Both failed in the beginning, but bid fair to stick on now, for they are doing good work for their clubs.

## NO CLUB ANXIOUS TO OVERTURN THIS BASE BALL RECORD

## A Record for Consecutive Defeats—Louisville in 1889 Lost Twenty-six Straight Games.

There is one baseball record that no club is anxious to overturn, and which everybody concerned will be glad to let stand until the end of time. That is the record for consecutive defeats, hung up in 1889 by the Louisville club of the old major league American association. On June 23, 1889, just twenty-seven years ago, the fans of the Kentucky metropolis broke out in wild enthusiasm, for the Colonels on that day defeated the St. Louis club by a score of 7 to 3, and thus put an end to the worst losing streak in the game as ever known. Up to the time of the victory over St. Louis the Colonels had lost twenty-six games in a row, and the few wavering supporters of the club were on the verge of abandoning all hope that the team would ever win a game.

The dubious feat of the Louisville club remains, and may always remain, the major league record. Only once has it been equaled in a minor league, and it has never been surpassed in any professional circuit. In

1913 the Meridian, Miss., club of the Cotton States league was nicked for twenty-six consecutive wallops, and had the world's record in sight when the team fell down and won a game.

The record losing streak in the National league was pulled off in 1890, the year of the Brotherhood war, when the Pittsburgh club dropped twenty-three games in a row. The whole bunch of Smoky City players went over to the Players' league and Guy Hecker, the new manager, had to build practically a new team, getting his material on the verge of bankruptcy, but the imperturbable and picturesque J. Palmer O'Neill managed to keep it afloat and retain the franchise for the Smoky City. After the long losing streak the fans deserted the sinking ship and gave their support to the Players' league team, which included most of the old Pittsburgh favorites. Games were transferred to other cities and even to neighboring towns in Pennsylvania and Ohio and West Virginia. The club set up another record that year by losing three games in a day. During the season Pittsburgh had fifty players on its roll at one time or another, nineteen of them being pitchers. The club lost 113 games in the year.

The American league losing streak record of twenty games was set up by Boston in 1906. Jimmy Collins, who managed the Red Sox from the first and who had kept the club in the first division and won two pennants prior to the fatal year, was charged by the Boston fans with neglecting his duties, and the veterans of the outfit seemed to go all to pieces. As a result Boston not only suffered the disgrace of setting an American league record for

consecutive defeats, but finished the season in the cellar, losing 105 games and winning only 49.

## BACHE'S REVIEW OF THE SITUATION

No Change in the Favorable Situation in General Business.

## SURPLUS RESERVES IN BANKS INCREASED

In Monetary Circles the Feature Continues to be the Arrivals of Gold from Ottawa and London.

There is no change in the favorable situation in general business. Production is going on at an enormous rate, met by equally good distribution with average good profits. In many lines sales have been made for the whole of this year, with good prospects for next year's business. There has been a recession of prices, due to very large production, and not because of slackening demand. Shading of prices is favorable because it is apt to stimulate business projects, which have been abandoned on account of the high prices.

Our foreign trade continues in largest figures, the exports for May being the greatest on record, with the trade balance for the fiscal year just ended estimated around \$2,500,000,000, which is double that of 1915. In the monetary area the feature continues to be arrivals of gold from Ottawa and London, which amount at this writing to \$116,000,000 since May 11th. The surplus reserves of the banks have increased and the New York Clearing House bank loans are now lower than since February. The country is threatened with the railway wage cloud. The employees have refused the offer of the railway managers to submit the matter to arbitration, either under the Federal Act, or better, to the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission. England five years ago, was faced with a similar situation, and a strike took place which lasted about a week, accompanied by tremendous losses for employers and the country generally. At that time the government effected a settlement of the strike by a promise of increase in freight rates, which promise was later carried out.

The Market.  
The market has taken Mexican news during the week to give it its ups and downs. Any adverse news would have done as well, in the present underlying situation, when nearly everything is favorable for advancing prices, except that Wall Street is full of stocks. Until these stocks are well absorbed by investors who pay for them and take them out of the market, sustained advance is not technically feasible. If this investment demand alone is depended upon, the process must be a gradual one.

On the other hand, very large sums of money would be available and would be used for outright purchases if margin holders sold out on a substantial decline. But these large buyers are ready only to act at much lower prices than those now prevailing. Good stocks are, nevertheless, safe and cheap at present levels. People with idle money can reap a long range harvest by buying these, dividing up among several selections in both rails and industrials. The bond market also presents many attractive purchases to hold, among which are foreign bonds brought out here. Money should not be kept idle waiting for calamity bargains.
