BOARD OF TRADE.

The Board of Trade has received a copy of the judgment of the Board of Railway Commissioners, dismissing the complaint of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association against general order 162 and the matter of relieving telegraph companies from the responsibility for failure to transmit messages.

The purpose of the complaint was that the conditions of contract with the telegraph companies imposed no penalties for failure to transmit messages and an amendment was sought to the order providing penalties therefor.

In response to an enquiry regarding the non-delivery of mail matter on Saturday afternoons, the Post Office department advises that it is proposed to continue the arrangement throughout the year with the exception of five or six weeks during the Christmas season. It is further stated that this is the practice at all city post offices throughout Canada.

A Cardiff firm, manufacturing ladies' raincoats, costumes, furs, etc., enquires with respect to facilities offered by British manufacturers here for the sale of their goods.

An enquiry has been received from a Maine party as to hay prices and chances for shipment put into province.

AN ANARCHISTIC PLOT DISCOVERED IN NEW YORK

Steps Taken by Bomb Squad to Protect Lives of Court Officials, Capitalists and Other Officials, Together With Homes and Public Buildings as Result of Startling Disclosures.

New York, Oct. 14.—Members of the bomb squad were tonight assigned to protect Supreme Court Justice Bartol S. Weeks, Assistant District Attorney Alexander L. Burke and Detective Sergeant Jas. J. Gogan, acting head of the squad, as the result of the finding of anarchistic circulars, which attack the three men and call on the workers of the steel and "every other industry" to arm themselves, as an added precaution, a special guard has been placed around public buildings, churches, and the homes of prominent capitalists and public officials. Federal agents are cooperating with the district attorney's office, and the police department in running down

the authors of the manifesto, which, signed "The American Anarchistic Federated Communist Soviet of New York" is said by the police to be the most radical society yet discovered. The circular is the first found here directly attacking individuals. Denouncing the action of the police in dispersing a mob of several thousand radicals who attempted to march up Fifth avenue last week without a permit, it calls upon Justice Weeks, now presiding at a trial in which the defendants are charged with criminal anarchy, Mr. Burke, prosecutor at the trial and Detective Gogan, to resign their "high positions" and assert that they will have "to pay the price for every worker killed or wounded."

QUEENS COUNTY MUNICIPAL ELEC. HELD TUESDAY

Majority of Councillors Elected Are Conservatives in Political Allegiance.

Considerable interest was shown in the municipal elections in Queens county, and the vote was about the average. The majority of the councillors elected are Conservative in politics.

In Hampstead, Queens County, the result of the poll was: J. A. Vanwart, 56; M. C. Webb, 51; C. T. Clark, 27; G. B. Slipp, 67. Mr. Vanwart is the well-known grocer of Hampstead Wharf, and Mr. Webb is a prosperous farmer of Hibernia. Mr. Clark and Mr. Slipp were the old councillors, who have given good service to the parish. All the candidates are Conservative in politics.

In the parish of Wickham, Hedra Akerley and A. D. Case were elected. Both are Conservatives.

At Gagetown the councillors elected were R. H. Weston and Charles Cotter, both Conservatives.

In Petersville the result of the poll was: Cooper, 149; Thorne, 145; McCracken, 132; Machum, 128. Cooper and Thorne, the councillors-elect, are Liberals.

At Chipman the successful candidates were Fraser and Burpee, the former being a Conservative and the latter an Independent.

Waterborough elected Farris and Barton, both Liberals.

In the parish of Johnstone Stewart and Perry, the old councillors, were returned by acclamation.

MYSTERY OF LONG STANDING AIRED IN MICH. COURT

Priest's Housekeeper on Trial for Murder of a Felician Nun Twelve Years Ago—Jealousy Said to Have Been Motive.

Leiland, Mich., Oct. 14.—Taking testimony in the trial of Mrs. Lypchinski, charged with the murder of Sister Mary John, a Felician nun, who disappeared near here twelve years ago, was begun in court yesterday with Father Andrew Benewski, pastor at that time, on the stand. Mrs. Lypchinski is over fifty years of age and was Father Benewski's housekeeper and Sister Mary a teacher at the convent.

Father Benewski told of the disappearance of the nun and of the countrywide search for her that ended only last year when a body, the prosecution holds, to be that of the missing Sister was discovered from beneath Holy Rosary church at Leiland. Questioned as to Sister Mary's relations with other teaching sisters and the people of the village, Father Benewski declared she was not well liked, and that he had received complaints from the parents of school children. He was on the stand at adjournment and will resume today.

The prosecution's opening statement declared that it would be shown that "Mrs. Lypchinski was jealous of the Sister, that she killed Sister Mary as the latter entered the church with flowers on August 23, 1907, and that she buried the nun in a shallow grave under the church." The prosecution also stated it was prepared to establish the identity of the body dug up last year and reburied in a cemetery by Jacob P. Ples, the sexton, as that of Sister Mary.

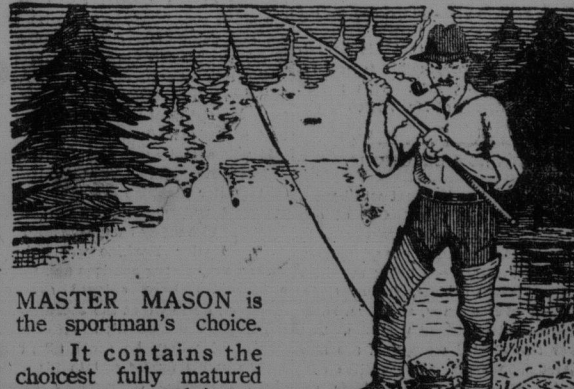
