## Trades And Labor Council Session

Will Open Temporary Labor  
Registering Bureau—Urge  
Gov't Employment Bureau  
—Officers Nominated.

The opening of a temporary labor registering bureau in the Trades and Labor Hall, corner of Prince William and Church streets was decided upon at a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council which was held in their hall last night, F. A. Campbell presiding.

It was further decided that a delegation be appointed to wait on Common Council next Tuesday and urge upon the City Fathers the establishing of a Dominion Government Employment bureau in the city.

A communication was received from the Metal Polishing and Stove Mounters of Sackville, N. B. stating that their strike was still on. Referred to the Union Label Committee.

The Municipal committee reported having attended the last meeting of the Municipal Council, and that that body had passed a resolution favoring Mothers Pensions, and were taking up the unemployment question.

The Union Label committee reported that a local firm was manufacturing union label overalls and pants. It was decided to advise all the locals in the city of the fact, and urge that their patronage be extended to the firm.

President Campbell reported having attended a meeting of representatives of several organizations who were interested themselves in an endeavor to alleviate the unemployment situation. That they might be better able to deal with the question a census of the unemployed had been begun.

It was decided that the council should co-operate, and assist in the plan by opening up its rooms, corner Prince William and Church streets at 9 a.m. today and on Monday to enable all those desiring employment to register.

A committee was appointed to wait on the Common Council in regard to this matter as has already been noted.

In answer to a question which appeared in one of the evening papers, it was stated that the reason there was no Dominion Government Labor Employment Bureau in the city, was due to a petty grievance some of the commissioners entertained toward the provincial government concerning the collection of the money for motor car licenses and liquor fines.

The Hydro-electric matter was considered and it was thought that the city council should not be asked to immediately and not leave it till the power was developed before deciding what is to be done with it.

The nomination of officers to be elected at the next meeting was carried out and resulted as follows:—

## Fordney Emergency Tariff Affected Canadian Exports

Tremendous Falling Off in  
Canada's Export Business  
Since U. S. Law Went in  
Force.

Ottawa, Dec. 16.—Statistics have been compiled by the Bureau of Statistics to show six months' operation of the Fordney emergency tariff on affected Canadian exports to the United States. The United States emergency tariff act was passed by Congress on May 23, signed by the President on May 27, and became effective on May 28. The emergency tariff has, therefore, now been in operation six months and the statistics compiled by the department compare this period with the corresponding period of last year.

For the month of November, 1921, the value of Canadian exports to the United States, affected by this tariff, was \$8,528,963, as compared with \$31,283,398 for the corresponding month of 1920; for the six months period of June-November, \$25,928,000, as compared with \$93,454,442. The following are among the commodities which show decreases for the six months period of this year, as compared with the corresponding period last year:

Sugar, 11,730 pounds, as against 49,921,489 pounds; tobacco, 3,171 pounds, as against 23,183 pounds; butter and substitutes thereof, 2,234,314 pounds, as compared with 4,778,888 pounds; cheese and substitutes thereof, 26 pounds, as against 4,106 pounds; fresh meat and meat of all kinds, 17,656 pounds, as against 25,753,390 pounds; meats preserved, 718,267 pounds as against 1,085,270 pounds; milk, fresh, 233,327 gallons, as against 1,061,288 gallons; milk preserved, 1,196,258 pounds, as against 8,878,195 pounds; potatoes, 464,424 bushels as against 1,472,390 bushels; cattle, 119,338 head, as against 320,667 head; sheep, 76,538 head, as against 146,414 head; wheat, 7,758,225 bushels, as against 18,588,728 bushels; wheat flour and semolina, 559,241 barrels, as against 412,838 barrels; wool, 127,146 pounds, as against 2,227,042 pounds.

## Motion Pictures On Ocean Liner

Interesting and Instructive  
Cinematograph Exhibitions  
Commended by Passengers  
Arriving on S.S. Melita.

The thoroughly interesting and instructive cinematograph exhibitions, which have become a feature of the voyages of all the liners of the Canadian Pacific Atlantic Service, were highly commended by one of the passengers who arrived yesterday on the S. S. Melita. During the trip across the Atlantic, pictures were screened twice for the benefit and entertainment of the cabin passengers, and on an equal number of occasions for the occupants of the steerage.

Each liner is now carrying certain standard pictures. Those shown on the S. S. Melita are nine in number. The first is entitled "Live Stock and Dairying in Canada." The second refers principally to the Maritime Provinces and bears the name "Canadian Maritime Industries." "By the Still Waters" depicts scenes in the Canadian Rocky Mountains. "Lake of the Hanging Glacier" shows Lake Louise and Banff. "Where East Meets West" portrays points in the British Columbia coast, Vancouver Harbor and docks, Empress of Asia, and the Eastern members of the world, including Hindus and Chinese on board steamers and various other places.

The sixth picture is entitled, "Getting Canada's Goods and Illustrations." It shows the various products of the Canadian Rockies. "On the way to Lake Windermere" is a very picturesque production showing the beautiful parts of the Okanagan Valley, in the Southern part of British Columbia. "Across Canada by C. P. R." shows every city and town from the Atlantic coast to the Pacific.

These pictures were taken at an enormous cost, and their value, from an educational viewpoint is prodigious. As it affords an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the geographical location of the cities, towns and industries in Canada, each picture is non-inflating, which is one of the requirements of Lloyd's when the insurance is taken out by the ship owners.

## FAIRVILLE TO GET STREET CAR SERVICE

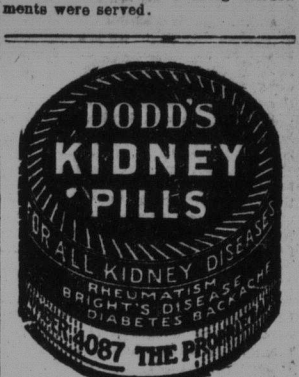
Fairville is to have a street car service at once, one car probably being placed on the route today and in the course of a few days three cars will be placed in commission giving the people twenty minute service to and from the city.
