French To Build 3000 Churches In Devastated Area... Paris, March 21.—Three thousand French churches partly or totally destroyed in the war are to be restored without waiting for German reparations. The money will be provided by the 200,000,000 franc (present exchange value \$1,000,000) church reconstruction loan which has just received a full subscription. The funds are presented by the Government, though the loan is the result of private initiative. It is pointed out that the commercial life of hundreds of towns will not be resumed until the churches are rebuilt as in French villages the church is the principal edifice about which the houses are grouped. Many of these churches are intact except the steeple and clock towers which were shot away.

PASSAGE OF PACIFIC PACT IS NOW DECLARED CERTAIN

Unofficial Forecast Places Margin of Votes at Three Over Necessary Two-Thirds—Ratification of Other Treaties Expected as Matter of Course.

Washington, March 20.—Vote on the four-power treaty will be taken in the Senate at 12 o'clock on Friday, March 24. Unanimous consent to that arrangement was obtained late this afternoon. It was granted after another desperate but futile attempt by the opposition to "derail" the original pact by amendment.

On all hands—alike by friends and foes of the treaty—it is considered that the fact is as good as over. The four-power pact to insure peace in the Pacific is safe. It will not go over the top with an abounding margin of strength to spare. But it will go over.

Unofficial prognostications fix the eventual pro-treaty vote at a minimum of 65, with only 28 against—the requisite three votes over an exact two-thirds of 62. More optimistic pacifists put the "hand wagon" vote well over 100, by sending a message to the Senate that from both Democratic and irreconcilable ranks there will be unexpected recruits when it is realized that the "spite bloc" has failed to smash the treaty.

Senator Johnson, Republican, of Missouri, delivered the final speech on behalf of the treaty, with the withdrawal from the Foreign Relations Committee after the Harding-Brandegee conference at the White House.

Senator Johnson's reservation reads: "The United States understands that it assumes no obligations, either in removing friction and controversy between the several high contracting parties concerning their insular possessions and possessions in the Pacific Ocean in the regions described, and without purpose to depart from the traditional American foreign policy which forbids participation by the United States in the settlement of political questions and contentions of foreign nations and governments."

CANADA FACES PROBLEMS OF HER DESTINY

Great Vacant Spaces to be Filled by a New Population.

(By John R. Bone in The Boston Transcript). Toronto, March 21.—How is Canada going to fill her great vacant spaces, shoulder her immense financial obligations incurred in the great war and reach the high road to greatness which is her oft proclaimed destiny?

Immigration is the universally acknowledged key to this transcendent problem. Immigration at the moment is an issue of infinite complexity. And though most of the greater minds in the country are grappling with the problem more seriously than ever before, so far the net has clearly illumined its intricacies.

Outstanding features in the problem may be summarized: 1. Though this is "Canada's century" Canada has "lost" 1,500,000 in habitants—20 per cent of her present population. The "loss" is estimated by adding the number of known immigrants in recent decades to the natural increase and comparing the sum with the increase in population shown by the census.
