Mr. Mosher, in commenting on the report, said that the strength of the Brotherhood was twice as much as the figures quoted in Mr. Kelley's finding, Mr. Mosher also took exception to the statement that all the clerical forces, except on the Canadian National Rasilways, had accepted a tentative wage agreement. "The clerical forces and other classes such as compose the C. B. R. E. have not accepted the tentative agreement in either Canada or the United States," Mr. Mosher said.
